SAINTS SIMON AND JUDE

The apostles, Saints Simon and Jude, whose feast day the Church celebrates on Friday, are known, also, by other names in the Gospels. St. Simon is referred to as "the Zealot" and St. Jude as "Jude Thaddeus". Apart from their names, however, little else is known about them. Although tradition holds that St. Jude travelled to Mesopotamia (modern day Iraq) and St. Simon to Egypt to preach the Gospel before both arrived in Persia (modern day Iran). It was here in Sufian (or at Siani) where they suffered martyrdom in A.D. 65 by having their throats cut.

St. Jude is thought to have been a relative of Jesus and it is also believed that he is the author of the Letter of Jude in the New Testament.

Today, St. Jude is most honoured as the patron of hopeless or impossible causes, whose intercession is sought in times of great need and despair. Both St. Bridget of Sweden and St. Bernard had visions from God asking them to accept St. Jude as the "Patron Saint of the Impossible".

St. Jude is often depicted holding an axe and a medallion bearing the face of Christ. St. Simon is often shown holding a saw as one tradition holds that he was martyred by being sawn in half.

The Church honours both of these great apostles for making known the salvation of Our Lord, for taking the faith across the world, and for the sacrifice of their lives for this.

Let us pray that we will continue to honour these saints and that, by their intercession, they will aid us in our daily battles so that in our lives we may make known the faith that they preached and so draw others closer to Our Lord and to His holy Church.

Christmas Day


12:00 a.m at Holy Trinity Church 7:30 a.m. at Holy Family Church 8:30 a.m. at Holy Family Church 10:00 a.m. at Holy Trinity Church 3:00 p.m. at Holy Trinity Church 5:00 p.m at Holy Family Church

There will be one Midnight Mass rather than two Masses. This is in consideration of the diocese's request that there not be a duplication of Masses at the same time when it is unnecessary.

This will mean that there will be eight times for Mass at Christmas across the day, from 4:30 p.m. Christmas Eve to 5:00 p.m. Christmas Day which more than allows for all parishioners to be able to attend Mass.

November Mass Envelopes

Envelopes for November Mass offerings are available by the doors of the churches. As is the tradition of the Church, the month of November is dedicated to praying and offering the holy sacrifice of the Mass for the repose of the holy souls in purgatory. These names will be written in the Book of Remembrance which will be placed at the altars of the churches.

Reminder Mandatory Safeguarding Training for All Parish Volunteers

As announced a number of times previously, the Diocese of Parramatta has made it mandatory for all volunteers in parishes to undertake training for the sake of collective responsibility and for the means of identifying children and adults at risk.

As such, the diocese has arranged for a series of safeguarding training modules to be undertaken, online or face to face. For most volunteers, the training will require four hours. Once completed, the certification of completion of the mandatory training will be valid for two years.

For those who would like to complete the training independently online, visit learning.safeguarding.org.au. You can then sign up with your email address and enrol in the three compliance modules (tagged in yellow).

For those who would prefer to complete the modules face to face, the parish has arranged for training. There will be two sessions, both of which must be attended. The first of the two sessions will be held on **Saturday, November 12** from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and the second of the two sessions on **Saturday, November 19** from 9:00 a.m to 11:30 a.m.

These sessions will allow participants to complete the three mandatory safeguarding modules: "Understanding Safeguarding and the Child Safe Standards," "Legal Compliance and Safeguarding: Risk of Significant Harm and Mandatory Reporting," and "Safeguarding Adults at Risk and Understanding Boundaries."

THE HOLY ROSARY

The Glorious Mysteries

Pope Francis's confidence in Our Lady developed when, in 1985, he attended a rosary that was being led by Pope John Paul II. The sight of the Pope on his knees moved him. He asked himself how much he trusted Our Lady: "I became aware of the density of the words of the Mother of Guadalupe to St. Juan Diego: "Don't be afraid, am I not perhaps your mother?" From that day, he said fifteen decades of the Rosary daily.

The mystery of the Resurrection fills us with great hopeful expectation. Death does not have the final word. Our life does not end at the grave, and we can say with St. Paul, "O death, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting?" (I Corinthians 15:55).

The mystery of the Ascension of our Lord reminds us to rely on the peace which Christ offers us. Shortly before His ascension He tells us, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27). Here He warns us that the peace the world offers does not satisfy. We need to remain detached from earthly possessions which do not ultimately satisfy—we were made for Heaven.

This mystery of the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost encourages us to place our faith in Him as we evangelise those in our lives who are far off from him.

Meditating upon the mystery of the Assumption of Mary into heaven gives us a glimpse at "what God has prepared for those who love him" (I Corinthians 2:9) and consequently fills us with hopeful expectation. Mary, after all, is the prototypical Christian. What God has done for her He will one day do for us. If we accept salvation and persevere, we will be cleansed of sin and given glorified bodies.

With the mystery of the coronation of Mary as Queen of Heaven and of Earth, Mary intercedes on behalf of her spiritual children, the Church. This mystery encourages us to entrust themselves and their good works to the only perfect creature, the Mother of God.

The Readings

Introit (Cf. Ps. 104:3-4)

Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice; turn to the Lord and his strength; constantly seek his face.

First Reading The Book of Ecclesiasticus (35:12-14, 16-18)

The Lord is a judge who is no respecter of personages. He shows no respect of personages to the detriment of a poor man, he listens to the plea of the injured party. He does not ignore the orphan's supplication, nor the widow's as she pours out her story. The man who with his whole heart serves God will be accepted, his petitions will carry to the clouds. The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds, until it arrives he is inconsolable nor will he desist until the Most High takes notice of him, acquits the virtuous and delivers judgement. And the Lord will not be slow, nor will he be dilatory on their behalf.

Second Reading

The Second Letter of St. Paul to Timothy (4:6-8, 16-18)

My life is already being poured away as a libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that Day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing. The first time I had to present my defence, there was not a single witness to support me. Every one of them deserted me – may they not be held accountable for it. But the Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed for all the pagans to hear; and so I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from all evil attempts on me, and bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Acclamation (II Cor. 5:19)

Alleluia, alleluia! God was in Christ, to reconcile the world to himself; and the Good News of reconciliation he has entrusted to us. Alleluia!

Gospel of Luke (18:9-14)

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else, 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'
