The Month of THE HOLY ROSARY



The Church honours the month of October by dedicating it in a special way to the Holy Rosary.

The word Rosary comes from the Latin word "rosarium" which means a "crown of roses" or a "garland of roses" and so whenever we devoutly pray the Rosary it is as though we are giving roses to our heavenly mother.

Tradition says that the Rosary was given by the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Dominic in the year A.D. 1214 at the Monastery of Notre-Dame-de-Prouille in France. At a time when many people could not read, the 150 Hail, Mary's of the Rosary became a way for them to pray in their own way the 150 psalms of the Bible.

From the 16th to the early 20th century, the structure of the Rosary remained unchanged. There were 15 mysteries, one for each of the 15 decades divided into the joyful, sorrowful, and glorious mysteries. In the 20th century, following the apparition of Our Lady at Fatima in Portugal a new prayer was added to the end of each decade beseeching Our Lord to save us from the fires of hell. Then in A.D. 2002 Pope St. John Paul II instituted the five luminous mysteries.

The Rosary is one of the great spiritual treasures of our faith. By meditating on the 20 mysteries of the Rosary, praying on the life of Our Lord and our holy Mother, we are drawn into the depths of the mystery of our salvation.

Our Lady promised St. Dominic that those who pray the Rosary will receive her special protection and the greatest graces, it will be a powerful armour against hell, and will become worthy of eternal life.

Reminder Mandatory Safeguarding Training for All Parish Volunteers

As announced a number of times previously, the Diocese of Parramatta has made it mandatory for all volunteers in parishes to undertake training for the sake of collective responsibility and for the means of identifying children and adults at risk.

As such, the diocese has arranged for a series of safeguarding training modules to be undertaken, online or face to face. For most volunteers, the training will require four hours. Once completed, the certification of completion of the mandatory training will be valid for two years.

For those who would like to complete the training independently online, visit learning.safeguarding.org.au. You can then sign up with your email address and enrol in the three compliance modules (tagged in yellow).

For those who would prefer to complete the modules face to face, the parish has arranged for training. There will be two sessions, both of which must be attended. The first of the two sessions will be held on **Saturday, November 12** from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and the second of the two sessions on **Saturday, November 19** from 9:00 a.m to 11:30 a.m.

These sessions will allow participants to complete the three mandatory safeguarding modules: "Understanding Safeguarding and the Child Safe Standards," "Legal Compliance and Safeguarding: Risk of Significant Harm and Mandatory Reporting," and "Safeguarding Adults at Risk and Understanding Boundaries."

Christmas Holy Mass Times

As Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will fall on a Saturday and Sunday this year, the intended Holy Mass schedule for these Masses will be the current Mass times, including the temporary Mass times, as well as one Midnight Mass:

Christmas Eve

4:30 p.m. at Holy Family Church 6:00 p.m. at Holy Trinity Church

Christmas Day

12:00 a.m at Holy Trinity Church 7:30 a.m. at Holy Family Church 8:30 a.m. at Holy Family Church 10:00 a.m. at Holy Trinity Church 3:00 p.m. at Holy Trinity Church 5:00 p.m at Holy Family Church

There will be one Midnight Mass rather than two Masses. This is in consideration of the diocese's suggestion that there not be a duplication of Masses at the same time when it is unnecessary.

This will mean that there will be eight times for Mass at Christmas across the day, from 4:30 p.m. Christmas Eve to 5:00 p.m. Christmas Day which more than allows for all parishioners to be able to attend Mass.


YEAR OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

Euchariotic Miracle of

LUDBREG, CROATIA


During Mass at Ludbreg in 1411, a priest doubted whether the Body and Blood of Christ were really present in the Eucharistic species. Immediately after being consecrated, the wine turned into Blood. Today the precious relic of the miraculous Blood still draws thousands of the faithful, and every year at the beginning of September the so-called "Sveta Nedilja" (Holy Sunday) is celebrated for an entire week in honour of the Eucharistic miracle that occurred in 1411.

In 1411 at Ludbreg in Croatia, in the chapel of the Count Batthyany's castle, a priest was celebrating Mass. During the consecration of the wine, the priest doubted the truth of transubstantiation, and the wine in the chalice turned into Blood. Not knowing what to do, the priest embedded this relic in the wall behind the main altar. The workman who did the job was sworn to silence. The priest also kept it secret and revealed it only at the time of his death. After the priest's revelation, news quickly spread and people started coming on pilgrimage to Ludbreg. The Holy See later had the relic of the miracle brought to Rome, where it remained for several years. The people of Ludbreg and the surrounding area, however, continued to make pilgrimages to the castle chapel. In the early 1500s, during the pontificate of Pope Julius II, a commission was convened in Ludberg to investigate






chapel where the miracle took place with frescoes depicting the stages of the miracle



the facts connected with the Eucharistic miracle. Many people testified that they had received marvellous cures while praying in the relic's presence. On April 14, 1513, Pope Leo X published a Bull permitting veneration of the holy relic which he himself had carried in procession several times through the streets of Rome. The relic was later returned to Croatia.

In the 18th century, northern Croatia was ravaged by the plague. The people turned to God to call upon His help, and the Croatian Parliament did the same. During the session held on December 15, 1739 in the city of Varazdin, they vowed to build a chapel at Ludbreg in honour of the miracle if the



Since 1721, the relic of the Precious Blood has been kept in a preciou monstrance of the Augsburg goldsmiths' school commissioned by Countess Eleonora Batthyany-Strattman, who gave it as a gift to the

plague ended. The plague was averted, but the promised vow was only fulfilled in 1994, when democracy was restored in Croatia. In 2005 in the votive chapel, the artist Marijan Jakubin painted a large fresco of the Last Supper in which Croatian Saints and Blesseds were drawn in place of the Apostles. St. John was replaced with Blessed Ivan Merz, who was included among the eighteen most important Eucharistic saints in the Church's history during the Synod of Bishops held in Rome in 2005. In the painting, Christ is holding in His hand a monstrance containing the relic of the Eucharistic miracle.

THE HOLY ROSARY

The Joyful Mysteries

Of the joyful mysteries of the holy Rosary Pope St. John Paul II said: "[these] are marked by the joy radiating from the event of the Incarnation. To meditate upon the joyful mysteries is to enter into the ultimate causes and the deepest meaning of Christian joy. It is to focus on the realism of the mystery of the Incarnation and on the obscure foreshadowing of the mystery of the saving Passion. Mary leads us to discover the secret of Christian joy, reminding us that Christianity is, first and foremost, evangelisation, 'good news', which has as its heart and its whole content the person of Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, the one Saviour of the world."

Meditating on the joyful mysteries demands that we meditate on our own lives and hold them against the lives and faith of our Lord and His mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and His earthly father, St. Joseph.

The mystery of the annunciation inspires us to put our faith in God, who wants good for His children (Matthew 7:11), rather than succumbing to temptation, as Eve did, that God is in some way holding out on us.

The mystery of the visitation demands humble service. Just as Mary, now the mother of God, did not consider herself too important to serve, so we too should be willing to serve, magnifying the Lord (Luke 1:46) as Mary did.

The mystery of the nativity calls us to great confidence; for just as the God of the universe chose to be born in a stable, so too does He choose to be born in the heart of anyone who will accept Him, regardless of the state of their soul.

The mystery of the presentation of Jesus in the Temple encourages us to strive and pray to look upon the material poor, such as Joseph and Mary were, with kindness and respect.

The mystery of the finding of the boy Jesus in the Temple demands that we evaluate our earthly relationships to see whether we are guilty of placing them before the will of God. Our Lord warns us, "He who loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me" (Matthew 10:37).

Introit (Ps. 129:3-4)

If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But with you is found forgiveness, O God of Israel.

First Reading The Second Book of the Kings (5:14-17)

Naaman the leper went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, as Elisha had told him to do. And his flesh became clean once more like the flesh of a little child.

Returning to Elisha with his whole escort, he went in and stood before him. 'Now I know' he said, 'that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel. Now, please, accept a present from your servant.' But Elisha replied, 'As the Lord lives, whom I serve, I will accept nothing.' Naaman pressed him to accept, but he refused. Then Naaman said, 'Since your answer is "No," allow your servant to be given as much earth as two mules may carry, because your servant will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any god except the Lord.'

Second Reading The Second Letter of St. Paul to Timothy (2:8-13)

Remember the Good News that I carry. 'Jesus Christ risen from the dead, sprung from the race of David'; it is on account of this that I have my own hardships to bear, even to being chained like a criminal – but they cannot chain up God's news. So I bear it all for the sake of those who are chosen, so that in the end they may have the salvation that is in Christ Jesus and the eternal glory that comes with it.

Here is a saying that you can rely on: If we have died with him, then we shall live with him. If we hold firm, then we shall reign with him. If we disown him, then he will disown us. We may be unfaithful, but he is always faithful, for he cannot disown his own self.

Gospel of Luke (17:11-19)

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way off and called to him, 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us.' When he saw them he said, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' Now as they were going away they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'
