This Sunday we celebrate Mother's Day, a day on which we give thanks to almighty God for the gift of our mothers and, in particular, the gift of our heavenly mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary.

In celebrating our earthly mothers we celebrate, also, our heavenly mother, Mary. From the Cross her son, Our Lord, said to her, "Woman, here is your son." And to the apostle whom he loved, St. John, "Here is your mother" (John 19:26-27). From that moment the Mother of God became the Mother of the Church and of all who believe in her son.

At the Second Vatican Council the council fathers taught again that Mary is our Mother.

In the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, Lumen gentium, they wrote: "Predestined from eternity by that decree of divine providence which determined the incarnation of the Word to be the Mother of God, the Blessed Virgin was on this earth the virgin Mother of the Redeemer, and above all others and in a singular way the generous associate and humble handmaid of the Lord. She conceived, brought forth and nourished Christ. She presented Him to the Father in the temple, and was united with Him by compassion as He died on the Cross. In this singular way she cooperated by her obedience, faith, hope and burning charity in the work of the Saviour in giving back supernatural life to souls. Wherefore she is our mother in the order of grace" (n. 61).

So throughout the history of the Church she has always honoured Mary with titles of motherhood, making known again and again the gift that Christ gave us from the Cross. She is known as Blessed Mother, Mother of God, Mother of Christ, Mother of the Redeemer, Mother of the Church, Mother of Victory, Mother of Mercy, Mother of Sorrows, Mother of All Graces, Mother Most Pure, Mother of Good Counsel, Mother Thrice Admirable, and Mother of Perpetual Help. But for us, the greatest title must be that we can call her Our Mother.

#### **Temporary Holy Mass Times**

The diocese have advised that the temporary Holy Mass times introduced by Fr. Andrew in service of parishioners during the pandemic restrictions will no longer be permitted. The diocese have thanked Fr. Andrew for his generosity in saying these additional Masses so that all parishioners would be able to attend Mass whilst attendance limits were placed on churches. However, the diocese have said that those conditions are no longer in place and, as such, there is no need for these additional times.

The Church honours the month of May as a Marian month in devotion to Our Lady, given to us as our mother from the Holy Cross.



## Saint Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort



St. Louis-Marie Grignion de Montfort (1673-1716) was a French Priest renowned for his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and for the praying of the holy Rosary.

He is one of the founders of the theology of Mary, known as Mariology, writing two books: "The Secret of Mary" and "True Devotion to Mary." He saw Jesus and Mary as inseparable from one another. He said consecration to Jesus in Mary was a special path to being conformed to, united and consecrated to Christ, because "the more a soul is consecrated to the Blessed Virgin Mary the more will it be consecrated to Jesus Christ."

## **CATECHISM** of the **CATHOLIC CHURCH**

### Holy Rosary

964 Mary's role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it. "This union of the mother with the Son in the work of salvation is made manifest from the time of Christ's virginal conception up to his death"; it is made manifest above all at the hour of his Passion.

971 "All generations will call me blessed": "The Church's devotion to the Blessed Virgin is intrinsic to Christian worship." The Church rightly honours "the Blessed Virgin with special devotion. From the most ancient times the Blessed Virgin has been honoured with the title of 'Mother of God,' to whose protection the faithful fly in all their dangers and needs... This very special devotion... differs essentially from the adoration which is given to the incarnate Word and equally to the Father and the Holy Spirit, and greatly fosters this adoration." The liturgical feasts dedicated to the Mother of God and Marian prayer, such as the rosary, an "epitome of the whole Gospel," express this devotion to the Virgin Mary.

## The Luminous Mysteries of the Holy Rosary

Since Pope Pius V in the 16th century there have been fifteen mysteries of the holy Rosary grouped into three sets: the joyful mysteries, the sorrowful mysteries, and the glorious mysteries.

Then, in 2002, Pope St. John Paul II added five new mysteries to the Rosary. These he called the luminous mysteries, or the mysteries of light. These mysteries, he said, are a meditation on the public life of Christ and of the revelation of the kingdom of God in Him.

The luminous mysteries are: 1. the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan; 2. Christ's first miracle at the Wedding at Cana; 3. Christ's proclamation of the kingdom of God and His call to conversion; 4. the Transfiguration of Christ on Mount Tabor; 5. the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper.

Each day of the week is dedicated to one of the groups of mysteries. The joyful mysteries are prayed on Mondays and Saturdays, the sorrowful mysteries on Tuesdays and Fridays, the glorious mysteries on Wednesdays and Sundays, and the luminous mysteries on Thursdays.

#### The Readings

#### Introit (Cf. Is. 48:20)

Proclaim a joyful sound and let it be heard; proclaim to the ends of the earth: The Lord has freed his people, alleluia.

#### First Reading **The Acts of the Apostles** (8:5-8, 14-17)

Philip went to a Samaritan town and proclaimed the Christ to them. The people united in welcoming the message Philip preached, either because they had heard of the miracles he worked or because they saw them for themselves. There were, for example, unclean spirits that came shrieking out of many who were possessed, and several paralytics and cripples were cured. As a result there was great rejoicing in that town.

When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them, and they went down there, and prayed for the Samaritans to receive the Holy Spirit, for as yet he had not come down on any of them: they had only been baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

#### **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 65:1-7, 16-20. R. see v. 1)

R. Let all the earth cry out to God with joy.

Cry out with joy to God all the earth, O sing to the glory of his name. O render him glorious praise. Say to God: 'How tremendous your deeds! R.

'Before you all the earth shall bow; shall sing to you, sing to your name!' Come and see the works of God, tremendous his deeds among men. R.

He turned the sea into dry land, they passed through the river dry-shod. Let our joy then be in him; he rules for ever by his might. R.

Come and hear, all who fear God. I will tell what he did for my soul: Blessed be God who did not reject my prayer nor withhold his love from me. R.

#### **Second Reading** The First Letter of St. Peter (3:15-18)

Reverence the Lord Christ in your hearts, and always have your answer ready for people who ask you the reason for the hope that you all have. But give it with courtesy and respect and with a clear conscience, so that

those who slander you when you are living a good life in Christ may be proved wrong in the accusations that they bring. And if it is the will of God that you should suffer, it is better to suffer for doing right than for doing wrong. Why, Christ himself, innocent though he was, had died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life.

#### **Gospel Acclamation** (Jn. 14:23)

Alleluia, alleluia! All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them. Alleluia!

#### Gospel **The Gospel of John** (14:15-21)

Jesus said to his disciples:

'If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you for ever, that Spirit of truth whom the world can never receive since it neither sees nor knows him; but you know him, because he is with you, he is in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come back to you. In a short time the world will no longer see me; but you will see me, because I live and you will live. On that day you will understand that I am in my Father and you in me and I in you. Anybody who receives my commandments and keeps them will be one who loves me; and anybody who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I shall love him and show myself to him.'

#### Communio (Jn. 14:15-16)

If you love me, keep my commandments, says the Lord, and I will ask the Father and he will send you another Paraclete, to abide with you for ever, alleluia.
