
16th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

The Catholic year is divided in many ways. From the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmastide, Lent, Eastertide, and Ordinary Time to the many solemnities, feasts, and memorials. But the year is also divided by months and days, each of which is dedicated to a particular aspect of our faith.

January is the month of the Holy Name of Jesus, February is the month of the Holy Family, March is the month of St. Joseph, April is the month of the Blessed Sacrament, May is the month of the Blessed Virgin Mary, June is the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, July is the month of the Precious Blood, August is the month of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, September is the month of the Seven Sorrows of Mary, October is the month of the Holy Rosary, November is the Month of the Holy Souls in Purgatory, and December is the month of the Immaculate Conception.

And then there are the days of the week. Sunday is dedicated to the Resurrection and the Holy and Undivided Trinity, Monday is dedicated to the Holy Spirit and the Holy Souls in Purgatory, Tuesday is the day of the Holy Angels, Wednesday the day of St. Joseph, Thursday is given in honour of the Blessed Sacrament, Friday honours Our Lord's Passion and His Sacred Heart, and Saturday is the day of the Blessed Virgin Mary and her Immaculate Heart, for just as Saturday is the gateway to Sunday, so the Blessed Virgin Mary leads us to her Son, our Lord.

# CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

#### The Liturgical Seasons

1163 "Holy Mother Church believes that she should celebrate the saving work of her divine Spouse in a sacred commemoration on certain days throughout the year. Once each week, on the day which she has called the Lord's Day, she keeps the memory of the Lord's resurrection. She also celebrates it once every year, together with his blessed Passion, at Easter, that most solemn of all feasts. In the course of the year, moreover, she unfolds the whole mystery of Christ... Thus recalling the mysteries of the redemption, she opens up to the faithful the riches of her Lord's powers and merits, so that these are in some way made present in every age; the faithful lay hold of them and are filled with saving grace."

1164 From the time of the Mosaic law, the People of God have observed fixed feasts, beginning with Passover, to commemorate the actions of the Saviour God, to give him thanks for them, to perpetuate their remembrance, and to teach new generations to conform their conduct to them. In the age of the Church, between the Passover of Christ already accomplished once for all, and its consummation in the kingdom of God, the liturgy celebrated on fixed days bears the imprint of the newness of the mystery of Christ.

# CATHOLIC Trivia

#### THE SIGN OF THE CROSS



The Sign of the Cross that marks the beginning and end of the Holy Mass, and which signifies the sealing of the Word of God "in our minds, on our lips and in our hearts" at the reading of the Gospel, has its origin in the first centuries of Christianity.

The sign of the cross, done by faith, has immense power. St. Benedict once did the sign of the cross over a poisoned drink meant to kill him, and as his hand moved reverently through the four directions of the cross, the glass shattered.

Each sign of the cross is also a sign—a renewal even—of one's personal decision to accept Christ as Lord and Saviour. How many times have we gone through the "motion of the cross" instead of the "sign of the cross"?

#### Introit (Ps. 53:6, 8)

See, I have God for my help.
The Lord sustains my soul.
I will sacrifice to you with willing heart,
and praise your name, O Lord, for it is good.

## First Reading The Book of Wisdom (12:13, 16-19)

There is no god, other than you, who cares for everything, to whom you might have to prove that you never judged unjustly. Your justice has its source in strength, your sovereignty over all makes you lenient to all. You show your strength when your sovereign power is questioned and you expose the insolence of those who know it; but, disposing of such strength, you are mild in judgement, you govern us with great lenience, for you have only to will, and your power is there. By acting thus you have taught a lesson to your people how the virtuous man must be kindly to his fellow men, and you have given your sons the good hope that after sin you will grant repentance.

#### Responsorial Psalm (Ps. 85:5-6, 9-10, 15-16. R.v. 5)

R. Lord, you are good and forgiving.

O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of love to all who call.

Give heed, O Lord, to my prayer and attend to the sound of my voice. R.

# Second Reading The Letter of St. Paul to the Romans (8:26-27)

The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what he means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God.

# Gospel The Gospel of St. Matthew (13:24-30)

Jesus put a parable before the crowds, 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everybody was asleep his enemy came, sowed darnel all among the wheat, and made off. When the new wheat sprouted and ripened, the darnel appeared as well. The owner's servants went to him and said, "Sir, was it not good seed that you sowed in your field? If so, where does the darnel come from?" "Some enemy has done this" he answered. And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" But he said, "No, because when you weed out the darnel you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow till the harvest; and at harvest time I shall say to the reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn."
