THE ASSUMPTION

of the

BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

In 1950 Venerable Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption, the fourth of the four dogmas or teachings of the Blessed Virgin, saying that Mary, at the end of her life, was taken up body and soul into heaven. Throughout her history, the Church, both in the east and the west, both the Catholics and the Orthodox, have held that the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken up into heaven body and soul.

But why is this so important? When you and I die our souls will be separated from our bodies. Our souls will stand before the throne of God in judgement and our bodies will be buried in the earth. Even for our Lord at His death His body was laid in a tomb. So why not for our Lady? Why did God not allow her body to be buried in the earth but, instead, carried her body and soul, into heaven? To understand this we need to understand just who the Blessed Virgin Mary is and why she matters in the history of our salvation.

At the beginning of time we were born into paradise and we lived with God who walked with us as He walked in the garden in the cool of the evening. But we chose ourselves, rather than God and by our pride, we were expelled from paradise to wander the earth in suffering and in pain. But neither did God remain in paradise but left His home to search for us and to call us back through Abraham, Noah, Isaac, and Jacob. But we preferred the life of filth to the life of grace and again and again we pushed God away. Until that day, two thousand years ago, when God no longer sent out others to look for us but came after us Himself.

In a young girl, of whom the world should never have heard, of a village that should never have mattered, in a country that was the backwaters of a great empire, at a time that should have been lost in history, was born God made Man. Whereas the sin of the woman Eve banished us from the sight of God — the faith of the woman Mary saw God set his sights on us. Whereas the self-esteem of the man Adam denied us our humanity — the self-sacrifice of Jesus gained for us the fulfillment of our humanity.

In her giving birth her virginity remained undefiled, in her falling asleep, she did not leave the world, but was assumed body and soul into Heaven, and crowned Queen. In the glory which she possesses in body and soul in Heaven, she is the image and the beginning of the Church as it is to be perfected in the world to come. And on earth she shines forth until the day of the Lord shall come, a sign of certain hope and comfort to the children of God.

Together we can keep the faith alive

The "Daughters of Mary, Help of Christians" belong to the religious family of the Salesians of Don Bosco and are devoted in particular to the education of young people. Twelve sisters of this community currently live and work in the apostolic vicariate of Chaco in the far north of Paraguay. In fact, they not only care for the young people here but also support the families, visiting the sick and the elderly, bringing them Communion, giving catechetical instruction and supporting the poor and disadvantaged with practical help and advice.

This is a vast region, covering around 37,000 square miles (96,000 km²), similar in size to South Korea or a little larger than Hungary, yet at the same time only sparsely populated, with just 30,000 inhabitants. The roads are very poor, and many places can only be reached by water. These include the two remote and isolated communities under the care of Sister Blanca. The people in them belong to two different indigenous tribes, and in order to reach them Sister Blanca has to make a journey of 2½ hours along the Paraguay River.

The other sisters also work in the town of Puerto Casado, where they care in particular for the members of the indigenous Maskoy people. "The grace of God has always accompanied the sisters of our community since they are instruments of the Gospel of Jesus Christ among the marginalised peoples of Puerto Casado and the Maskoy Indians

—an impoverished ethnic group which is continuing to develop, thanks to the support of the Salesian brothers and sisters," explains Sister Marciana Toledo Vergara, the Superior of the community.

Sr. Emilia works in five different indigenous communities, preparing the children for their First Holy Communion, caring for the sick and supporting the local teachers. She also supports the students of the Maskoy people and generally helps the indigenous peoples in their daily struggle for survival. Meanwhile, Sr. Justa works together with some of the committed laywomen of the parish, visiting the various suburbs of Puerto Casado. Sr. Irene organises catechetical sessions and leisure activities for the children and young people and also guides a young people's group in the parish, helping to organise the liturgy and working to help the most needy.

In Nu Apu'a the sisters have established a boarding school for 110 children whose families live too far from the nearest school. In this way, these children also have a chance to gain a proper school education.

These are just a few examples of the outstanding work the sisters are doing. They offer their service selflessly and for no reward, and so we in turn would like to support them for the current year with basic subsistence aid of \$8,000.

ST. DOMINIC



During this month of August, where we honour Our Blessed Mother, we also remember in a special way St. Dominic whose Feast we celebrated on the 3rd August.

Tradition says that Our Lady gave the Holy Prayer of the Rosary to St. Dominic which has been prayed by Catholics around the world since.

The Province of the Order of Preachers (the Dominicans) which covers Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands is dedicated to the Assumption and so this month holds special significance for these heirs of St. Dominic.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

The Assumption

966 "Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death."

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians: In giving birth you kept your virginity; in your Dormition you did not leave the world, O Mother of God, but were joined to the source of Life. You conceived the living God and, by your prayers, will deliver our souls from death.

She is our Mother in the order of grace.

967 By her complete adherence to the Father's will, to his Son's redemptive work, and to every prompting of the Holy Spirit, the Virgin Mary is the Church's model of faith and charity. Thus she is a "preeminent and... wholly unique member of the Church"; indeed, she is the "exemplary realisation" (typus) of the Church.

CATHOLIC Trivia

Bleeding Host in Poland Confirmed to be the True Body and Blood of Christ

In Poland a consecrated host fell on the floor and picked up and placed in a container with water, according to the report by the Bishop of Legnica. The falling of the host and it's preservation occurred on Christmas day of 2013. After the host was conserved in a container with water by the Parish Priest, it gradually began to turn to change colour, possessing red-bloody stains.



The final medical statement by the Department of Forensic Medicine found that "in the histopathological image, the fragments (of the Host) were found containing the fragmented parts of the cross striated muscle. It is most similar to the heart muscle. Tests also determined the tissue to be of human origin, and found that it bore signs of distress."

The Vatican, in 2017, approved the findings and reports of the case.

The Readings

Introit (Cf. Ps. 73:20, 19, 22, 23)

First Reading The First Book of the Kings (19:9, 11-13)

Gospel The Gospel of St. Matthew (14:22-33)

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying, 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord,' he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'
