THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD of CHRIST

"If you do not eat the flesh
of the Son of Man
and drink his blood,
you have no life in you.
He who feeds on my flesh
and drinks my blood
has eternal life,
and I will raise him up
on the last day.
For my flesh is real food
and my blood real drink."
(John 6, 53-55)

Church teaching has always been that the Eucharist is really and truly the substance of Christ's body and blood, that when we receive the Eucharist we actually receive, on our hands and on our tongues, the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. We believe that to be ordained a priest is to be given the power to change ordinary bread and wine into the very substance of Christ's Body and Blood. We believe that after consecration, the substance is no longer bread, but the substance of Christ, although the attributes of the bread and the wine, their qualities like colour and taste and texture remain the same. And that is why we genuflect before it, for if it were only a piece of bread, we'd be committing idolatry every time we genuflect before the tabernacle.

We celebrate Corpus Christi, or the Body and Blood of Christ, today because of the vision of a small nun, Juliana of Liège eight-hundred years ago. She had a dream in which she saw the Church beneath the full moon, but that full moon had one dark spot on it, and that dark spot she believed to be the absence of a great feast in honour of the Body and Blood of Christ. Soon, Christ Himself appeared to her and asked that she plead for the institution of the feast of Corpus Christi.

For twenty years she had that vision but told no one, until she told her confessor and he told the bishop. At first the bishop was unsure of the girl's claim but soon after he heard of the miracle of Bolsena. Bolsena is a town in Italy and in the year A.D. 1263, a priest, whilst celebrating the Mass, had doubts as to whether the bread and wine truly became the Body and Blood of Christ. At that moment the host he held in his hands began to bleed onto the altar. Today the cloth on which the blood was caught is still kept and on it can be seen the face of Christ.

A year later the Pope decreed that the feast of the Body and Blood of Christ was to be celebrated throughout the world and is a public holiday in many parts of the world.

There are stories, verified by doctors, of women who lived on nothing else but the Body and Blood of Christ which they received daily in Holy Communion. There is Alexandrina Marina in Portugal who for thirteen years, from A.D. 1942 to A.D. 1955 ate and drank nothing except the Body and Blood of Christ, but lost no weight nor suffered any signs of malnutrition. There is Marthe Robin of France who for thirty years up until her death in A.D. 1981 took no food or drink except Holy Communion.

Pope Benedict XVI repeatedly said that God's love is the solution to every problem, personal and social, and that the Eucharist is the ultimate manifestation of that love.

This is not just a theory, this is not just some story, this is reality. The bread and wine are not something like the Body and Blood of Christ, they are not representative of His Body and Blood. The fact is that after the invocation of the Holy Spirit and the prayer of consecration of the Priest, the bread and wine no longer exist at all. There is no bread and there is no wine at all. Where they once were there is now and only the Body and the Blood of Jesus Christ. On the altar, on your hands and on your tongue lies God.

First Thursday Holy Mass in Latin


This Thursday, being the first Thursday of the month, Holy Mass in Latin will be said at Holy Trinity Church at 6:00 p.m.


If there are to be flowers decorating the sanctuary every week, as people want, then we need many more people to volunteer.

Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, Year B

The Readings

Introit (Cf. Ps. 80:17)

He fed them with the finest wheat and satisfied them with honey from the rock.

First Reading The Book of Exodus (24:3-8)

Moses went and told the people all the commands of the Lord and all the ordinances. In answer, all the people said with one voice, 'We will observe all the commands that the Lord has decreed.' Moses put all the commands of the Lord into writing, and early next morning he built an altar at the foot of the mountain, with twelve standing-stones for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he directed certain young Israelites to offer holocausts and to immolate bullocks to the Lord as communion sacrifices. Half of the blood Moses took up and put into basins, the other half he cast on the altar. And taking the Book of the Covenant he read it to the listening people, and they said, 'We will observe all that the Lord has decreed; we will obey.' Then Moses took the blood and cast it towards the people. 'This' he said 'is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you, containing all these rules.'

Responsorial Psalm (*Ps.* 115:12-13, 15-18. R. v. 13)

R. I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord.

How can I repay the Lord for his goodness to me?
The cup of salvation I will raise;
I will call on the Lord's name. R.

O precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his faithful.

Your servant, Lord, your servant am I; you have loosened my bonds. R.

A thanksgiving sacrifice I make: I will call on the Lord's name. My vows to the Lord I will fulfil before all his people. R.

Second Reading The Letter to the Hebrews (9:11-15)

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than one made by men's hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives; how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God. He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were

called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

Behold the bread of angels, sent For pilgrims in their banishment, The bread for God's true children meant, That may not unto dogs be given: Oft in the olden types foreshowed; In Isaac on the altar bowed, And in the ancient paschal food, And in the manna sent from heaven.

Come then, good shepherd, bread divine, Still show to us thy mercy sign; Oh, feed us still, still keep us thine; So may we see thy glories shine In fields of immortality;

O thou, the wisest, mightiest, best, Our present food, our future rest, Come, make us each thy chosen guest, Co-heirs of thine, and comrades blest With saints whose dwelling is with thee.

Gospel Acclamation (Jn. 6:51-52)

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live for ever.

Gospel The Gospel of Mark (14:12-16, 22-26)

On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, his disciples said to Jesus, 'Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the passover?' So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the city and you will meet a man carrying a pitcher of water. Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, "The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there.' The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover. And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.' After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.

Communio (*Jn.* 6:57)

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him, says the Lord.
