Apostolorum Apostola

The Church celebrates the Feast of St. Mary Magdalene every July 22. It was St. Thomas Aquinas who reserved the special title, *Apostolorum apostla* ("Apostle of the Apostles") to St. Mary Magdalene, saying, "Just as a woman had announced the words of death to the first man, so also a woman was the first to announce to the Apostles the words of life" (*Super Ioannem*, ed. *Cai*, § 2519).

St. Mary Magdalene is one of the most prominent woman in the New Testament. Her name comes from the town of Magdala in Galilee, where she was born. Scripture introduces her as a woman "who had been healed of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out" (*Lk* 8:2). She was a disciple of Christ, who accompanied and ministered to Him (*Lk* 8:2-3) and she was one of the women present at Christ's crucifixion. St. Mary Magdalene is also known to be one of the first witnesses of the Resurrection. The Gospels all describe her as going to the tomb on Easter morning.

Pope Benedict XVI said of St. Mary Magdalene, "The story of Mary of Magdala reminds us all of a fundamental truth... A disciple of Christ is one who, in the experience of human weakness, has had the humility to ask for his help, has been healed by him and has set out following closely after him, becoming a witness of the power of his merciful love that is stronger than sin and death".

Let us pray, especially at this time, that the witness of St. Mary Magdalene will encourage us to persevere, holding on to our faith in the providence of God, and let us beseech the intercession of her who stood by in the suffering of Our Lord.

On Thursday, 15 August, as the church celebrates the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the parish will hold its annual candlelight procession in honour of this day.

Following Holy Mass at Holy Trinity Church at 6:00 p.m. the procession will form and walk to Holy Family Church.

To help with the procession, we are asking for people to volunteer as safety marshalls whose role it will be to help people to cross the roads safely and to help guide the procession. If you would like to help with this then please speak with Fr. Andrew.

The parish bus will be available to take people from Holy Family Church to Holy Trinity Church for Mass and the procession and then to take people back to Holy Trinity Church after the procession. Thank you to Joe Chidiac for once again arranging this for us.

Please join us as we honour the Most Blessed Virgin Mary on this most holy day as we take our faith to the streets as a sign of our gratitude to Almighty God for all that He does for us and also as a witness to our holy Catholic faith.

The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a holy day of obligation, meaning that all are obligated to attend Mass on that day (except for those legitimately unable to do so because of their age or their health). On that day there will be two Masses said for the solemnity. The first being at Holy Family Church at 9:15 a.m. and the second at Holy Trinity Church at 6:00 p.m. There will also be a vigil Mass the evening before (which fulfils the obligation to attend Mass) which will be said at Holy Family Church at 6:00 p.m.



St. Mary Magdalene

St. Mary Magdalene is one of the greatest saints of the Bible and a legendary example of God's mercy and grace. The precise dates of her birth and death are unknown, but we do know she was present with Christ during his public ministry, death and resurrection. She is mentioned at least a dozen times in the Gospels. During Our Lord's ministry, it is believed that St. Mary Magdalene followed Him, part of a semi-permanent entourage who served Him and His Disciples.

St. Mary Magdalene is the patron saint of of contemplative life, converts, glove makers, hairdressers, penitent sinners, people ridiculed for their piety, perfumeries, pharmacists, tanners, and women. Her feast is celebrated on July 22.

The Common Good

1906 By common good is to be understood "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily." The common good concerns the life of all. It calls for prudence from each, and even more from those who exercise the office of authority. It consists of three essential elements:

1907 ...[R]espect for the person as such... the fundamental and inalienable rights of the human person... such as "the right to act according to a sound norm of conscience and to safeguard... privacy, and rightful freedom also in matters of religion."

1908 ...[T]he social well-being and development of the group itself... accessible to each what is needed to lead a truly human life: food, clothing, health, work, education and culture, suitable information, the right to establish a family, and so on.

1909 ...[P]eace, that is, the stability and security of a just order. It presupposes that authority should ensure by morally acceptable means the security of society and its members. It is the basis of the right to legitimate personal and collective defense.

The Criminal Whose Prayer Moved Mary's Statue To Hold Him Tight, **Saving Him From Execution**

A young man, who lived his life as a highway robber, was caught and sentenced to death. The devil, seeing him so upset, appeared to him and said he would free him if he would renounce Christ and the Sacraments. This he did. The devil then said to him that the last thing he must do is to renounce Mary and her protection. But this, he said he would never do, instead saying the prayer his mother taught him: "Blessed Virgin, help me in the hour of my death."

On his way to the gallows, passing by a statue of Mary, he prayed to her with his usual prayer: "Blessed Virgin, help me in the hour of my death", and the statue, in the presence of everyone, bowed its head and saluted him. Deeply moved, he begged to be allowed to kiss the feet of the statue. The executioners refused but afterwards gave in because of the clamour of the people. The young man stooped to kiss her feet, and Mary extended her arm from that statue, took him by the hand and held him so strongly that no man could move him. At this the crowd demanded that he be pardoned, and with this, he was set free and went on to lead life devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Readings

Introit (Ps. 53:6, 8)

See, I have God for my help. The Lord sustains my soul. I will sacrifice to you with willing heart, and praise your name, O Lord, for it is good.

First Reading The Prophet Jeremiah (23:1-6)

'Doom for the shepherds who allow the flock of my pasture to be destroyed and scattered—it is the Lord who speaks! This, therefore, is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says about the shepherds in charge of my people: You have let my flock be scattered and go wandering and have not taken care of them. Right, I will take care of you for your misdeeds—it is the Lord who speaks! But the remnant of my flock I myself will gather from all the countries where I have dispersed them, and will bring them back to their pastures: they shall be fruitful and increase in numbers. I will raise up shepherds to look after them and pasture them; no fear, no terror for them any more; not one shall be lost—it is the Lord who speaks!

'See, the days are coming—it is the Lord who speaks —when I will raise a virtuous Branch for David, who will reign as true king and be wise, practising honesty and integrity in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel dwell in confidence. And this is the name he will be called: The Lord-our-integrity.'

Second Reading The Letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians (2:13-18)

In Christ Jesus, you that used to be so far from us have been brought very close, by the blood of Christ. For he is the peace between us, and has made the two into one and broken down the barrier which used to keep them apart, actually destroying in his own person the hostility caused by the rules and decrees of the Law. This was to create one single New Man in himself out of the two of them and by restoring peace through the cross, to unite them both in a single Body and reconcile them with God. In his own person he killed the hostility. Later he came to bring the good news of peace, peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near at hand. Through him, both of us have in the one Spirit our way to come to the Father.

Gospel Acclamation (Jn. 10:27)

Alleluia, alleluia! My sheep listen to my voice, says the Lord; I know them, and they follow me. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of Mark (6:30-34)

The apostles rejoined Jesus and told him all they had done and taught. Then he said to them, 'You must come away to some lonely place all by yourselves and rest for a while'; for there were so many coming and going that the apostles had no time even to eat. So they went off in a boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But people saw them going, and many could guess where; and from every town they all hurried to the place on foot and reached it before them. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some length.

Communio (*Ps.* 110:4-5)

The Lord, the gracious, the merciful, has made a memorial of his wonders; he gives food to those who fear him.
