

While a hot drink, or the warmth of sitting beside the heater can comfort us physically, our Holy Catholic Faith offers an even deeper source of spiritual warmth and unfailing guidance: the inspiring lives of the Holy Saints. Through the month of July, the Church's calendar shines brightly with a constellation of holy men and women whose examples can truly invigorate our lives toward Almighty God.

They offer a perfect example of perseverance and unwavering trust in God's plan even when it unfolds slowly and mysteriously.

So this month, consider reflecting on these holy saints, and seek their powerful intercession, that they may help illuminate your path to God.

Important Notice Regarding Receiving Holy Communion

There has been an unfortunate increase in Sacred Hosts being dropped when receiving Holy Communion. Whilst these are accidents, we all have a responsibility to ensure that the Sacred Host—the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Our Lord, Jesus Christ—is guarded and protected.

When receiving Holy Communion, please do not step to the side to consume the Sacred Host, and under no circumstances, turn away from facing the altar before you consume the Sacred Host. Please ensure that you consume the Sacred Host whilst still facing the altar and the Priest or the Extraordinary Minister.

Mass Offering Envelopes

Requests for Masses to be offered for various intentions can be sought by completing the Mass Offering envelopes which are located near the doors of the churches. Please clearly write the details of your intention on the envelope, and hand it directly to the priest before or after a Mass.

This will ensure your intention is not missed and will allow the priest to confirm your request.




Pilgrims walk to Immaculate Heart of Mary (Tighes Hill) and return to Sacred Heart Cathedral at approximately 1.00pm.

St. Benedict

Beyond his role as the Father of Western Monasticism, St. Benedict's life is rich with remarkable accounts. Did you know he miraculously survived at least two poisoning attempts? Once, when monks tried to poison his wine, the chalice shattered when he made the Sign of the Cross over it. Another time, a raven carried away a poisoned loaf of bread he had been sent. These events are often depicted in his iconography, showcasing divine protection.

St. Benedict's influence also extended fay beyond the monastery walls. His "Rule," with its emphasis on "Ora et Labora" (Prayer and Work), became a blueprint for orderly living, not just for monks but for the wider society. This balance contributed significantly to the rebuilding of European civilisation after the fall of the Roman Empire, leading Pope St. Paul VI to declare him a patron saint of Europe.

Many of the monasteries he founded were strategically located. This facilitated the monks' selfsufficiency and their ability to cultivate the land. This focus on practical self-reliance and spiritual discipline, became a hallmark of the Benedictine tradition.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

Sunday Eucharist

2177 "The Sunday celebration of the Lord's Day and his Eucharist is at the heart of the Church's life. "Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal church.

2178 This practice of the Christian assembly dates from the beginnings of the apostolic age. The *Letter to the Hebrews* reminds the faithful "not to neglect to meet together, as in the habit of some, but to encourage one another."

2179 A parish is a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a particular church; the pastoral care of the parish is entrusted to a pastor as its own shepherd...It is the place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. The parish initiates the Christian people into the ordinary expression of the liturgical life: it gathers them together in this celebration; it teaches Christ's saving doctrine; it practices the charity of the Lord in good works and brotherly love.



The Saint Benedict Medal



The Saint Benedict Medal is a powerful and cherished sacramental deeply rooted in Catholic tradition.

A Holy Shield: The St. Benedict Medal isn't just a piece of metal; it's a holy object blessed by the Church to bring us closer to God, and offer protection.

Driving Away Evil: At the back of the medal, you'll see letters around the cross. These are the first letters of a powerful Latin prayer: "Vade retro Satana!" which means "Begone Satan!" This prayer is a strong plea for deliverance from the devil's influence and all evil.

Miraculous Protection: On the front, you'll see St. Benedict holding a broken chalice and a raven with poisoned bread. This remind us of times when wicked men tried to poison him, but God miraculously saved him. Due to this, the medal is often invoked for protection against poisons of all kinds, both physical and spiritual.

A Good Death: The words "May we be strengthened by his presence in the hour of our death" highlight patronage for a holy and happy death, helping us to die in God's grace.

The Readings

Introit (Cf Psalm 16:15)

As for me, in justice I shall behold your face; I shall be filled with the vision of your glory.

First Reading Book of Deuteronomy (30:10-14)

Moses said to the people: 'Obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping those commandments and laws of his that are written in the Book of this Law, and you shall return to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul. 'For this Law that I enjoin on you today is not beyond your strength or beyond your reach. It is not in heaven, so that you need to wonder, "Who will go up to heaven for us and bring it down to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" Nor is it beyond the seas, so that you need to wonder, "Who will cross the seas for us and bring it back to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" No, the Word is very near to you, it is in your mouth and in your heart for your observance.'

Second Reading Letter of St. Paul to the Colossians (Colossians 1:15-20)

Christ Jesus is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation, for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth: everything visible and everything invisible, Thrones, Dominations, Sovereignties, Powers all things were created through him and for him. Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things in unity. Now the Church is his body, he is its head. As he is the Beginning, he was first to be born from the dead, so that he should be first in every way; because God wanted all perfection to be found in him and all things to be reconciled through him and for him, everything in heaven and everything on earth, when he made peace by his death on the cross.

> **Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke** (Luke 10:25-37)

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him, says the Lord.
