

July: A month dedicated to the PRECIOUS BLOOD OF JESUS

During the month of July, the Church in her wisdom calls us to direct our hearts and minds to a most profound and ancient devotion: honouring the Most Precious Blood of Jesus. This devotion, deeply rooted in our Catholic tradition and rich with spiritual significance, presents us with a beautiful opportunity to deepen our understanding of Christ's boundless love and the immense sacrifice He made for our salvation.

From his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, where his sweat became as drops of blood falling to the ground, through the cruel scourging, the crowning with thorns, and finally his ultimate sacrifice on the Cross, Jesus ceaselessly poured our His Blood for our redemption. Each sacred drop was offered out of an unfathomable love, a perfect testament to His willingness to endure unimaginable suffering so that we, might be reconciled with our Heavenly Father. This Precious Blood is not merely a symbol; it is the very price of our salvation, the ransom paid for our souls. It is the divine cleanser that purifies us from the stain of sin, sanctifies our very being, and elevates us to the dignity of adopted children of God. It is through His Blood that we have been bought back from spiritual death and given the glorious promise of eternal life. As the divinely inspired Letter to the Hebrews solemnly declares, "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins" (Hebrews 9:22). This truth underscores the absolute necessity and efficacy of Christ's sacrifice.

Devotion of the Precious Blood of Jesus has been a vital cornerstone of Catholic spirituality for centuries, a wellspring of grace for countless souls. Saints throughout history, from the early martyrs to the great mystics, have found deep solace, profound inspiration, and immense spiritual power in contemplating this profound mystery. We recall the fervent words of St. Catherine of Siena, who spoke passionately of the "Blood of Christ, price of our redemption," recognising its infinite value. This devotion also intimately connects us to the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist. In every Holy Mass, under the humble appearances of bread and wine, we truly receive the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ Himself. This is a tangible, Sacramental continuation of His one, eternal sacrifice on Calvary, allowing us, here and now, to partake in the very grace won for us by His Precious Blood.

May we this July, open ourselves fully to God's inexhaustible grace and infinite mercy, never forgetting the immense, love that flowed from the Sacred Heart of Jesus, poured out for each one of us.

Important Notice Regarding Receiving Holy Communion

There has been an unfortunate increase in Sacred Hosts being dropped when receiving Holy Communion. Whilst these are accidents, we all have a responsibility to ensure that the Sacred Host—the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Our Lord, Jesus Christ—is guarded and protected.

When receiving Holy Communion, please do not step to the side to consume the Sacred Host, and under no circumstances, turn away from facing the altar before you consume the Sacred Host. Please ensure that you consume the Sacred Host whilst still facing the altar and the Priest or the Extraordinary Minister.

Mass Offering Envelopes

Requests for Masses to be offered for various intentions can be sought by completing the Mass Offering envelopes which are located near the doors of the churches. Please clearly write the details of your intention on the envelope, and hand it directly to the priest before or after a Mass.

This will ensure your intention is not missed and will allow the priest to confirm your request.

Weekly Adoration at Holy Family Church

Weekly Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be held every Wednesday evening, after the 6:00 p.m. Mass.

This change in time will commence from Wednesday 9th July, and will replace the current adoration time offered on Sunday evenings.

Opportunities for confessions will still be available every Wednesday evening between 6:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.




Pilgrims walk to Immaculate Heart of Mary (Tighes Hill) and return to Sacred Heart Cathedral at approximately 1.00pm.

St. Gaspar del Bufalo

St. Gaspar del Bufalo was a holy Italian priest who lived during a turbulent era when the Catholic Faith faced many challenges. Despite the difficulties, Fr. Gaspar dedicated his life to God and the salvation of souls, always focused on the Most Precious Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

He deeply understood that the Blood shed by Christ on the Cross was the very price of our redemption - the infinite wellspring of God's mercy and grace, able to wash away sins and heal spiritual wounds. This profound devotion wasn't just a private piety; it was a powerful call to action.

Guided by Divine Providence, he founded the Missionaries of the Precious Blood. His aim was for these priests to preach holy missions, leading people to a fervent love for Our Crucified Saviour and the wondrous power of His Most Precious Blood. He also helped establish the Adorers of the Most Precious Blood with Saint Maria De Mattias.

Fr. Gaspar emphasised repentance, reconciliation, and the boundless merits of the Precious Blood. He encouraged frequent Holy Communion and meditation on Our Lord's Passion as paths to spiritual renewal.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

The Precious Blood

478 "You were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your fathers...with the Precious Blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot. He was destined before the foundation of the world but was made manifest at the end of the times for your sake.

613 Christ's death is both the *Paschal sacrifice* that accomplishes the definitive redemption of men through "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," and the *sacrifice of the New Covenant,* which restores man to c o m m u n i o n with G o d by reconciling him to God through the "blood of the covenant, which was poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.

766 The Church is born primarily of Christ's total self-giving for our salvation, anticipated in the institution of the Eucharist, fulfilled on the cross. "The origin and growth of the Church are symbolised by the blood and water which flowed from the open side of the crucified Jesus." "For is was from the side of Christ as he slept the sleep of death upon the cross that there came froth the 'wondrous sacrament of the whole Church"... so the Church was born from the pierced heart of Christ...on the cross.



Why do Catholics genuflect?

Genuflecting, bending the right knee to the ground, is a profound and ancient gesture of adoration in our Catholic faith. This humble action signifies our deep reverence and humility before the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament, reserved in the tabernacle.

Historically, bending the knee was a common way to show respect to royalty or those in authority. The Church adopted and transformed this custom, reserving the acts of genuflection on the right knee exclusively for God. When we enter a pew, pass before the tabernacle, or encounter the exposed Blessed Sacrament during adoration, our genuflection is a silent yet powerful acknowledgement of Christ rule present - Body, Blood, Soul, Divinity under the appearance of bread and wine.

This isn't merely a tradition; it's a deeply spiritual expression of our faith, worship, and awe. It reminds us that we are in the presence of our Lord and King, an invisible yet tangible reality. Genuflecting is a beautiful, physical manifestation of our profound belief in the Eucharist, serving as a constant reminder of the sacred mystery at the heart of our faith.

For those who can, a gentle genuflection upon entering the church remains a beautiful personal act of faith.

The Readings

Introit (Cf Psalm 47:10-11)

Your merciful love, O God, we have received in the midst of your temple. Your praise, O God, like your name, reaches the ends of the earth; your right hand is filled with saving justice.

First Reading The Prophet Isaiah (66:10-14)

Rejoice, Jerusalem, be glad for her, all you who love her! Rejoice, rejoice for her, all you who mourned her! That you may be suckled, filled, from her consoling breast, that you may savour with delight her glorious breasts. For thus says the Lord: Now towards her I send flowing peace, like a river, and like a stream in spate the glory of the nations. At her breast will her nurslings be carried and fondled in her lap. Like a son comforted by his mother will I comfort you. And by Jerusalem you will be comforted. At the sight your heart will rejoice, and your bones flourish like the grass. Second Reading Letter of St. Paul to the Galatians (Galatians 6:14-18)

The only thing I can boast about is the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom the world is crucified to me, and I to the world. It does not matter if a person is circumcised or not; what matters is for him to become an altogether new creature. Peace and mercy to all who follow this rule, who form the Israel of God.

I want no more trouble from anybody after this; the marks on my body are those of Jesus. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, my brothers. Amen.

Gospel Acclamation (Colossians 3:15. 16)

Alleluia, alleluia! May the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, and the fullness of his message live within you. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of St. Matthew (16:13-19)

The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house. Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you. Cure those in it who are sick, and say, "The kingdom of God is very near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, that on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.'

The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said, 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed the man who seeks refuge in him.
