

Following our reflection on Mary as Mother of God and our spiritual Mother, we now turn to the venerable devotions that have shaped Catholic piety for centuries. These timeless practices are not empty rituals; they are powerful tools give to us by the Church to deepen our relationship with Our Lady and, through her, with her Son.

The Holy Rosary stands as the cornerstone of Marian devotion. Described by Popes as a "compendium of the Gospel," the Rosary guides us through the joyful, sorrowful, glorious, and luminous mysteries of Christ's life, all through the eyes of His Mother. Its recitation is a simple yet profound way to meditate on the life of Christ, offering a spiritual weapon against the forces of darkness and a source of immeasurable grace. We hold the beads and pray the prayers, but it is Mary who draws us into a deeper contemplation of her Son's Paschal Mystery.

Sacramentals also play a vital role. The Brown Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel is one of the most cherished. Rooted in a vision granted to St. Simon Stock in the 13th century, it is a sign of consecration to Mary, promising her protection and a powerful intercession at the hour of death. It signifies out commitment to live a life in imitation of Mary. Similarly, the Miraculous Medal, given through St. Catherine Laboure, is a powerful sacramental, bringing grace and protection to those who wear it with faith. These small tokens are a constant, physical reminder of Mary's maternal care and the spiritual realities that govern our lives.

Another profound practice is Total Consecration to Mary, most notably promoted by St. Louis Marie Grignion de Montfort. This act of entrusting one's entire life - body, soul, and spiritual goods - to Mary is a radical way of living out

our baptismal vows. By becoming her slaves of love, we seek to live entirely for Jesus through her, trusting that she will form us into faithful disciples. Consecration is not about worshipping Mary, but about allowing her to lead us to a more perfect union with her Son.

Finally, we are called to honour Mary through the rhythm of the Church's year. Observing her feast days, such as her Assumption (a Holy Day of Obligation which we celebrate next Friday), and the Feast of the Queenship of Mary, allows us to join the entire Church in celebrating her heavenly glory.

These devotions are not optional extras, but rich traditions that connect us to the saints and to the heart of the Church. They provide a tangible path to grow closer to Our Lady, who never fails to lead us to her Son. Next week, we will find inspiration in the lives of the saints who exemplified this profound Marian piety.



The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a holy day of obligation, meaning that all are obligated to attend Mass on that day (except for those legitimately unable to do so because of their age or their health). On that day there will be three Masses said for the solemnity. The first being at Holy Trinity Church at 8:15 a.m., then at Holy Family Church at 9:15 a.m. and lastly at Holy Trinity Church at 6:00 p.m. A Vigil Mass will also be offered on Thursday evening (which fulfils the obligation to attend Mass) at Holy Family Church at 6:00 p.m.

St. Jeanne Jugan

In the mid-19th century, a humble woman names Jeanne Jugan began a work of immense charity that would touch the lives of countless elderly poor. From a single act of kindness - bringing an elderly, blind, and paralysed woman into her small home - St. Jeanne founded the Little Sisters of the Poor. Her life was a testament to the power of trust in Divine Providence, a trust that was deeply intertwined with her devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

St. Jeanne lived a life of profound poverty herself, relying entirely on donations to feed, clothe, and care for those she served. When faced with empty cupboards and mounting needs, her response was always the same: "The Blessed Mother will help us." She would send the sisters out with a simple prayer to Mary, and miraculously, the necessary provisions would often arrive. For St. Jeanne, Mary was the ultimate Mother of Providence, a loving intercessor who never failed to come to the aid of her children. Her life reminds us that when we place our trust in Mary, she guides us to the heart of herSon and provides for all our needs, both spiritual and material.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

Immaculate Conception

490 "To become the mother of the Saviour, Mary "was enriched by God with gifts appropriate to such a role." The angel Gabriel at the moment of the annunciation salutes her as "full of grace." In fact, in order for Mary to be able to give the free assent of her faith to the announcement of her vocation, it was necessary that she be wholly borne by God's grace.

491 Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full or grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Saviour of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin."

492 The "splendour or an entirely unique holiness" by which Mary is "enriched from the first instant of her conception" comes wholly from Christ: she is "redeemed, in a more exalted fashion, by reason of the merits of her Son.

Why we Stand, Sit & Kneel

Have you ever wondered why we change our posture so often during Mass? Each position - standing, sitting, and kneeling - has deep historical and theological meaning, helping us to physically participate in the liturgy.

Standing is a sign of respect and readiness. It's the posture we taken when we listen to the Gospel, stand before the priest as he welcomes us to Mass, and profess our faith in the Creed. It signifies our readiness to do God's will and is the posture of a resurrected people, echoing the first Christians who stood to pray as a sign of their belief in the Resurrection.

Sitting is a position of listening and meditation. We sit for the Liturgy of the Word, during the readings, and for the homily. This posture allows us to rest and calmly absorb the teachings of Scripture and the priest's reflection on them. It's the posture of a student eager to learn.

Kneeling is the most profound sign of reverence and adoration. We kneel during the Consecration, when the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. This posture expresses our humility and worship before the true presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. It's a deep act of prayer and submission to God. We kneel before the blessed sacrament in quiet prayer and before the Blessed Sacrament in adoration bringing our prayers and petitions before Him.

The Readings

Introit (Cf Psalm 73:20,19,22,23)

Look to your covenant, O Lord, and forget not the life of your poor ones for ever. Arise, O God, and defend your cause, and forget not the cries of those who seek you.

First Reading Book of Wisdom (Wisdom 18:6-9)

That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that,

once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage.

This was the expectation of your people,

the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies;

for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes

you made us glorious by calling us to you.

The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord:

that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike;

and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers.

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 32:1. 12. 18-20. 22. R. v.12)

R. Happy the people the Lord has chosen to be his own.

Ring out your joy to the Lord, O you just; for praise is fitting for loyal hearts. They are happy, whose God is the Lord, the people he has chosen as his own. R.

The Lord looks on those who revere him, on those who hope in his love, to rescue their souls from death, to keep them alive in famine. R.

Our soul is waiting for the Lord. The Lord is our help and our shield. May your love be upon us, O Lord, as we place all our hope in you. R.

Second Reading Letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-12)

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended. It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

Gospel Acclamation (Matthew 24:42.44)

Alleluia, alleluia! Be watchful and ready:

You know not when the Son of Man is coming.

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 12:32-48)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming", and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

'The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him.'

Communio (Psalm 147:12,14)

You have given us, O Lord, bread from heaven, endowed with all delights and sweetness in every taste.
