

Having explored the foundational truths of Mary's identity and the devotions that draw us closer to her, we now turn to the saints. Their lives offer us powerful examples of how a profound love for the Blessed Mother can lead to extraordinary holiness and apostolic zeal.

St. Louis Marie Grignion de Montfort is perhaps the most wellknown proponent of Marian devotion. His writing, True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin, has inspired countless souls, including popes, to consecrate themselves entirely to Jesus through Mary. He taught that Jesus chose Mary as the perfect channel to come to us, and therefore, we should go to Him through her. This radical devotion, which sees Mary not as an end but as the surest means to a deeper relationship with Christ, transformed his spiritual life and ministry.

Another towering figure of Marian piety is St. Bernard of Clairvaux. Known for his eloquent sermons and writings, St. Bernard often spoke of Mary as the "Mediatrix of all graces," a title that highlights her essential role in the distribution of God's blessings. He famously taught that "it was the will of God that we should have everything through Mary." His teachings remind us that we should confidently approach our Mother, for her intercession is powerful and always turned toward our good.

More recently, St. Maximilian Kolbe demonstrated a heroic love for the Immaculata. A Franciscan friar and martyr, he founded the Militia Immaculata to bring souls to Christ through Mary. For him, Mary was the perfect model of Christian life and the key to spiritual combat. His willingness to sacrifice his life for a fellow prisoner at Auschwitz, a final act of heroic charity, was a testament to his total consecration to Our Lady. He saw Mary as the ultimate expression of God's love and mercy in the world.

Finally, we look to the gentle yet profound piety of St. Thérèse of Lisieux. Though she did not write extensive theological works on Mary, her "Little Way" of spiritual childhood was a living imitation of Mary's humility and trust. St. Thérèse saw Mary not as a distant queen, but as a loving Mother and a perfect model of simple, daily faithfulness to God's will.

These saints are but a few examples from the Church's vast history. They teach us that Marian devotion is not a single practice but a way of life - a continuous act of trust in the Mother of God that leads us ever closer to the heart of her Son. Next week, in our final instalment, we will reflect on Mary's role as Queen and Mediatrix and find hope in her maternal intercession for the Church and the world. Let us look to their shining examples and find the courage to follow their path of trusting devotion to our Blessed Mother.

St. Gemma Galgani

In the late 19th century, a young Italian mystic named Gemma Galgani endured a life marked by intense physical suffering and profound spiritual experiences, including the stigmata. Known as the "Gem of Christ", St. Gemma's deep love for Jesus was inseparable from her tender devotion to His Mother, Mary.

St. Gemma saw the Blessed Virgin not just as a heavenly queen, but as her personal, loving Mother. She often felt Mary's presence and sought her guidance, particularly during her periods of suffering. St. Gemma found immense solace and strength in the Rosary, which was a constant prayer in her life. She believed that Mary was her great protector and advocate, a maternal figure who comforted her and let her closer to the heart of her Son. Her devotion to the Sorrowful Mother was especially profound; St. Gemma united her own suffering with those of Mary at the foot of the cross. St. Gemma's life remind us that in times of trial, we can, like her, find refuge in the maternal embrace of Our Lady, who draws us ever closer to Our Lord and Saviour. Her story is a beautiful testament to the power of a childlike trust in Mary's care.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

Mary, Full of Grace

721 Mary, the all-holy ever-virgin Mother of God, is the masterwork of the mission of the Son and the Spirit in the fullness of time. For the first time in the plan of salvation and because his Spirit has prepared her, the Father found the dwelling place where his Son and his Spirit could dwell among men. In this sense the Church's Tradition has often read the most beautiful texts on wisdom in relation to Mary. Mary is acclaimed and represented in the liturgy as the "Seat of Wisdom." In her, the "wonders of God" that the Spirit was to fulfill in Christ and the Church began to be manifested.

722 The Holy Spirit, prepared Mary by his grace. It was fitting that the mother of him in whom "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" should herself be "full of grace." She was, by sheer grace, conceived without sin as the most humble of creatures, the most capable of welcoming the inexpressible gift of the Almighty. It was quite correct for the angel Gabriel to greet her as the "Daughter of Zion": "Rejoice."

Catholic Symbolism

Have you ever noticed the symbols around a church and wondered what they mean? These images are not just for decoration; they are a visual language, rich with theological meaning that tells the story of our faith and connects us to centuries of tradition.

The fish (Ichthys) is one of the oldest and most recognisable Christians symbols. During the time of Roman persecution, early Christians used it as a secret sign to identify one another, as the Greek letters for "fish" from an acrostic for "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour." It was a powerful and discreet way to affirm their faith.

The lamb is another profound symbol, representing Jesus as the "Lamb of God" who was sacrificed for the sins of the world.

The dove symbolises the Holy Spirit, often depicted descending upon Jesus at His baptism or appearing during Pentecost.

The anchor, a lesser-known but significant symbol, represents hope, signifying our secure and steadfast faith in Christ amidst the storms of life.

Finally, the 'IHS' monogram is a shortened version of Jesus' name in Greek, a powerful reminder of His presence. These symbols serve as a constant, silent catechism, enriching our understanding of the faith. They stand as reminders of the sacred story that began long before us and continues to unfold.

The Readings

Introit (Psalm 83:10-11)

Turn your eyes, O God, our shield; and look on the face of your anointed one; one day within your courts is better than a thousand elsewhere.

First Reading The Prophet Jeremiah (Jeremiah 38:4-6. 8-10)

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

Second Reading Letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 12:1-4)

With so many witnesses in a great cloud on every side of us, we too, then, should throw off everything that

hinders us, especially the sin that clings so easily, and keep running steadily in the race we have started. Let us not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still in the future, he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.

Gospel Acclamation (John 10:27)

Alleluia, alleluia! My sheep listen to my voice, says the Lord; I know them, and they follow me. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 12:49-53)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I have come to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were blazing already! There is a baptism I must still receive, and how great is my distress till it is over!

'Do you suppose that I am here to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. For from now on a household of five will be divided: three against two and two against three; the father divided against the son, son against father, mother against daughter, daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughter-in-law, daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'
