As we begin the month of August, the Church turns its gaze with particular reverence to the Blessed Virgin Mary. This entire month is dedicated to honouring Our Lady, a tradition rooted in centuries of devotion. To mark this special time, we embark on a four-part series of reflections, each exploring a vital aspect of Marian piety. This week's reflection begins by laying the essential foundation: her unique dignity as the Mother of God and, by extension, our spiritual Mother.

At the heart of Catholic belief lies the profound truth that Mary is truly the Theotokos, that is the bearer of God. This dogma, solemnly defined at the Council of Ephesus in A.D. 431, declares that Mary gave birth not merely to a human being, but to the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, fully God and fully man, Jesus Christ. When Mary conceived by the Holy Spirit, she conceived God Himself in her womb. This truth elevates her beyond all other

creatures, making her the most exalted of humanity, chosen by God from all eternity for this singular role. She is not merely the Mother of Jesus' human nature, but the Mother of the one Person who is God.

From this sublime reality flows her intimately personal relationship with each of us: Mary is our spiritual Mother. From the very Cross, amidst His agony, our Lord Jesus Christ looked upon His beloved disciple John and then upon His Mother, declaring, "Woman, behold your Son!" And to John, "Behold your mother!" (John 16:26-27). In this tender moment, Christ bequeathed His Mother to all humanity, making her a maternal guide and intercessor for every soul seeking Him. As our spiritual Mother, Mary embraces us with unfailing love, interceding for us before her Son and guiding us on the path to holiness.

Her preparation for this divine

maternal role began at the moment of her conception. The Church teaches that Mary was conceived without the stain of Original Sin, preserved immaculate from the first instant of her being - the dogma of her Immaculate Conception. This singular grace rendered her a fitting and pure dwelling place for God Incarnate.

Mary's foundational place was foretold in the very dawn of creation in the Protoevangelism, where God promised that the seed of the woman would crush the head of the serpent (Genesis 3:15). She is the new Eve, through whom life and salvation entered the world, reversing the curse of the first Eve. Embracing Mary as the Mother of God and our Mother is not merely a devotion, but an essential aspect of our Catholic faith. It is through this foundational understanding that our love for her blossoms, leading us closer to her Son, Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Welcome BBQ for Fr. Galbert and Fr. Joseph



The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a holy day of obligation, meaning that all are obligated to attend Mass on that day (except for those legitimately unable to do so because of their age or their health). On that day there will be two Masses said for the solemnity. The first being at Holy Family Church at 9:15 a.m. and the second at Holy Trinity Church at 6:00 p.m. There will also be a vigil Mass the evening before (which fulfils the obligation to attend Mass) which will be said at Holy Family Church at 6:00 p.m.

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

St. Joseph Cafasso

Nestled amongst the bustling streets of 19th-century Turin, a humble priest, St. Joseph Cafasso, quietly carved out a legacy of profound compassion and unwavering faith. Though often overshadowed by his more famous student, St. John Bosco, Cafasso, known as the "priest of the gallows," lived a life deeply rooted in Christ, a life nourished by tender and constant devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. St. Joseph Cafasso ministered tirelessly to prisoners, offering spiritual solace and guiding countless souls facing execution towards reconciliation with God. This arduous work, demanding immense spiritual fortitude, was sustained by his profound trust in Mary. He saw her not just as an intercessor, but as a loving Mother, always ready to console, strengthen, and lead her children to Jesus, even in the darkest hours. He often encouraged those he ministered to, and his own spiritual children, to turn to Mary with unwavering confidence.

For St. Joseph Cafasso, Mary was the sure path to grace, a beacon of hope illuminating the path to redemption. His life reminds us that even in the most challenging of vocations, Mary's maternal embrace offers unwavering help to all.

Mary's Predestination

489 "God sent forth his Son," but to prepare a body for him, he wanted the free cooperation of a creature. For this, from all eternity God chose for the mother of his Son a daughter of Israel, a young Jewish woman of Nazareth in Galilee, "a virgin betrothed to a man whose name is Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary."

489 Throughout the Old Covenant the mission of many hold women prepared for that of Mary. At the very beginning there was Eve; despite her disobedience, she received the promise of a posterity that will be victorious over the evil one, as well as the promise that she will be the mother of all the living. By virtue of this promise, Sarah conceives a son in spite of her old age. Against all human expectation God chooses those who were considered powerless and weak to show forth his faithfulness to his promises: Hannah, the mother of Samuel; Deborah... and many other women. Mary "stands out among the poor and humble of the Lord, who confidently hope for and receive salvation from him. After a long period of waiting the times are fulfilled in her, the exalted Daughter of Sion, and the new plan of salvation is established.

The Shortest Papacies

Ever wondered about the shortest times a Pope has sat on the Chair of St. Peter? While some pontiffs have guided the Church for decades, others have worn the Fisherman's Ring for mere days! The undisputed record for the briefest papacy belongs to Pope Urban VII. Elected on September 15, 1590, he tragically succumbed to Malaria just 13 days later, on September 27. Despite his incredibly fleeting time in office, Urban VII managed to issue a decree proposing strict measures against nepotism, that is the use of power or influence to benefit family and friends. Remarkably, he even instituted what's considered the world's first public smoking ban, threatening excommunication for those who lit up near a church!

Other remarkably short papacies occurred throughout the history of the Church. Pope Boniface VI reigned for only 16 days in April 896 during a particularly turbulent period for the papacy. Similarly, Pope Celestine IV's pontificate in 1241 lasted just 17 days before his death. In more recent times, Pope John Paul I in 1978 served for just 33 days. Affectionately nicknamed "The Smiling Pope" due to his gentle demeanour, his sudden passing shocked the world. These incredibly brief tenures are fascinating glimpses into the unpredictable nature of history, which at times has been faced by the Church.

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 89:3-6. 12-14. 17. R. v.1)


R. In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

Second Reading Letter of St. Paul to the Colossians

(Colossians 3:1-5, 9-11)

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed - and he is your life - you too will be revealed in all your glory with

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life: fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.
