SEALING OUR DEVOTION:

A CONSECRATION TO THE IMMACULATE HEART

As the month of August, dedicated in a special way to honour the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary, draws to a close, we arrive at a moment for a new beginning. This final weekend, we are presented with a unique opportunity to crown our reflections with a personal act of love and trust: Filial Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Over the past 4 weeks, we have contemplated Mary's sublime dignity as the Mother of God and our spiritual Mother, a gift bestowed upon us by Christ from the Cross. We have also explored the power of timeless devotions, found inspiration in the exemplary piety of the saints, and reflected on her glorious roles as Queen and Mediatrix. Now, in a culminating act, we are invited to put our faith into action by giving ourselves entirely to her loving care.

Consecration is our profound "yes" to Mary's motherhood. It is a conscious decision to live under her maternal mantle, seeking her guidance and intercession in all things. It is a proven path to holiness, as demonstrated by saints like St. Louis de Montfort and St. Maximilian Kolbe, who recognised that Mary, being perfectly united to God's will, is the surest and quickest way to union with her Son. By following their example, we align

ourselves with a powerful tradition of seeking holiness through her.

In this final weekend of August, make a resolution to offer yourself completely to the one who is both your spiritual Mother and your Queen. By entrusting ourselves to her Immaculate Heart, we place ourselves under her royal protection and open ourselves to the abundant graces that flow from her Son. Take time this weekend for prayerful reflection, considering all that you wish to surrender to her care: your past, your future, your hopes, your worries, and your family.

Lastly, commit yourself this weekend to make an Act of Consecration (shown on left) with a sincere heart, perhaps after receiving Holy Communion. It is a simple yet profound prayer that marks a beautiful new beginning of a deeper relationship with Our Lady. By making this Act of Consecration, we do not conclude our devotion to Mary, but rather deepen it.

May this weekend of August mark a beautiful beginning of a more profound relationship with the Blessed Virgin Mary, one that guides you on a continual path of grace, all the way to her Son, Jesus Christ.

Important Notice about parking cars at Holy Family Church

Our priests often have to leave the church property at a moment's notice to attend to important parish duties or appointments. When the driveway is blocked, it causes unnecessary delays and can make it difficult for them to carry out their ministry.

We ask that you show consideration and respect for our priests and their work by parking sensibly, and not blocking the presbytery driveway or garages.

Please allow the upper end of the driveway, opposite the statue of the Pieta, for those who are bringing elderly or those unable to walk long distances to Mass. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

This will ensure your intention is not missed and will allow the priest to confirm your request.




Clergy Support Foundation Father's Day Appeal

Blessed Carlo Acutis

Blessed Carlo Acutis, a young Italian who died at the age of 15 from Leukaemia, offers a compelling model of holiness for the modern world. Despite living a life that mirrored his peers, complete with video games and a love for the internet, Carlo's spiritual life was profoundly deep. He used his computer skills not for personal gain, but to build a website that documented Eucharistic miracles around the globe, aiming to help people realise the real presence of Jesus. This act of tech evangelism earned him the title of patron saint of the internet.

His intensive love for the Eucharist was deeply intertwined with a tender and constant devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Blessed Carlo affectionately called Mary "the only woman in my life" and he prayed the Rosary daily, seeing it as a powerful means to grow closer to both her and her Son. He understood that Mary, as a mother, would guide him and protect him on his journey toward holiness. His life is a testament that sanctity is achievable in the digital age, a simple and attainable goal through devotion to the Sacraments and a childlike love for the Blessed Mother.

CATECHISM of the **CATHOLIC CHURCH**

Mary, Mother of the Church

964 Mary's role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it. "This union of the mother with the Son in the work of salvation is made manifest from the time of Christ's virginal conception up to his death", it is made manifest above all at the hour of His Passion: Thus the Blessed Virgin advanced her pilgrimage of faith, and faithfully persevered in her union with her Son unto the cross. There she stood, in keeping with the divine plan, enduring with her only begotten Son the intensity of his suffering...

965 After her Son's Ascension, "Mary aided the beginnings of the Church by her prayers." In her association with the apostles and several women, "we also see Mary by her prayers imploring the gift of the Spirit, who had already overshadowed her in the Annunciation."

966 "Finally the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death."

Unsung Moments of the Mass

Every Mass is filled with rich symbolism, even in moments we might overlook. Beyond the familiar readings and communion, several subtle actions hold profound meaning, drawing us deeper in the sacred mystery.

Consider the Incensing: This ancient practice is a powerful sensory experience. The rising smoke symbolises our prayers ascending to God, while the fragrance represents the presence of the Holy Spirit and the sanctification of what is censed - the altar, the Gospel book, and even the people. It is a profound sign of honour and reverence.

Another often-missed moment is the preparation of the gifts, where the priest pours a tiny drop of water into the wine. He guietly prays, "By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity." This beautiful ritual symbolises the very heart of the Incarnation - the union of Christ's divine nature with our human one. which we are invited to share.

Finally, during the "Agnus Dei" (Lamb of God), a small particle of the consecrated Host is dropped into the chalice. The commingling symbolises the reunification of Christ's body and blood, a reminder that we are wholly receiving the living, and resurrected Christ. By noticing these actions, we can better understand the sacred drama unfolding before us.

The Readings

Introit (Cf Psalm 85:3,5)

Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long. O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of mercy to all who call to you.

First Reading Book of Ecclesiasticus (Sirach 3:17-20, 28-29)

My son, be gentle in carrying out your business, and you will be better loved than a lavish giver. The greater you are, the more you should behave humbly, and then you will find favour with the Lord; for great though the power of the Lord is, he accepts the homage of the humble. There is no cure for the proud man's malady, since an evil growth has taken root in him. The heart of a sensible man will reflect on parables, an attentive ear is the sage's dream.

Second Reading Letter to the Hebrews (Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24)

What you have come to is nothing known to the senses: not a blazing fire, or a gloom turning to total darkness, or a storm; or trumpeting thunder or the great voice speaking which made everyone that heard it beg that no more should be said to them. But what you have come to is Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem where the millions of angels have gathered for the festival, with the whole Church in which everyone is a 'first-born son' and a citizen of heaven. You have come to God himself, the supreme Judge, and been placed with spirits of the saints who have been made perfect; and to Jesus, the mediator who brings a new covenant.

Gospel Acclamation (Matthew 11:29)

Alleluia, alleluia! Take my yoke upon you; learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 14:1. 7-14)

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

Communio (Psalm 30:20)

How great is the goodness, Lord, that you keep for those who fear you.
