OUR LADY OF SORROWS

~ A September Dedication ~

The month of September is a time of profound reflection, drawing our hearts and minds to the deep and sacred sorrows of the Blessed Virgin Mary. While a special memorial is observed on September 15th, the entire month is a time to contemplate her Seven Sorrows, inviting us to contemplate the suffering she endured for our salvation. This devotion is not a morbid fascination with pain, but rather a spiritual exercise that draws us closer to Christ through His Mother.

Our Lady's sorrows are a testament to her unique and intimate participation in her Son's redemptive work. From the prophecy of Simeon that a sword would pierce her soul at the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, to her vigil at the foot of the Cross, Mary's life was a continuous offering of suffering united with her Son's. She is, as the Church has long called her, "Co-redemptrix," not in the sense of adding to Christ's

infinite merits, but in her unique and unparalleled cooperation with Him. She suffered with Christ, and through her suffering, she became the Mother of all the faithful.

Here in our parish, the recent celebration of the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross holds a special significance, and it is a feast that is inextricably linked to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Cross, a symbol of suffering and humiliation, was transformed by Christ's death into the instrument of our salvation and a sign of triumph. Mary's sorrows are likewise transformed. The sword that pierced her soul was the very sword that, through Christ's victory on the Cross, broke the chains of sin and death. Her deepest pain was at the foot of the Cross, yet it was there that she was given to us as our Mother.

The sorrowful mysteries of the Rosary, and the daily prayers and devotions offered throughout this month, are an invitation to stand with Mary at the foot of the Cross.

This is not a passive contemplation, but an active one. We are called to unite our own daily crosses and sufferings - be they big or small - to the perfect suffering of Christ and the sacrificial sorrows of His Mother. By doing so, our own suffering gains new meaning and merit, becoming a powerful intercession for our own salvation and for the salvation of the world.

So in these final weeks of September, let us not only reflect on the sorrows of Our Lady, but also ask for her intercession. Let us entrust our struggles, our pains and our hopes to her Immaculate Heart. Let us remember that in her sorrow, she became the gate of heaven, and that through her, we can come to a deeper love and understanding of her Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, who through His Cross and Passion, has set us free.

St. Pius of Pietrelcina

St. Pius of Pietrelcina (Padre Pio), the stigmatised Capuchin friar, is renowned for his spiritual insights and unwavering faith. At the core of his spirituality, however, was a profound devotion to Our Lady of Sorrows. For Padre Pio, Mary's cosuffering with her Son was not merely a historical event, but a living, painful reality that he embraced.

Pio frequently meditated on the Blessed Mother's "seven swords of sorrow," particularly her anguish during Christ's Passion. He understood that her sorrows were integral to the work of redemption. He often encouraged his spiritual children to contemplate Mary's sorrows, believing it fostered true contrition and a deeper love for Jesus. "Love the Madonna and pray the Rosary," he would advise, recognising the power of this practice.

His own life of immense pain and spiritual battles uniquely united him to the Sorrowful Mother. Padre Pio saw in Mary a perfect model of endurance and love, and his devotion was a heartfelt bond with her as she suffered with her Son for humanity's salvation. He continually pointed souls to Jesus through the heart of His Sorrowful Mother.

A Universal Call to Prayer

2566 Man is in search of God. In the act of creation, God calls every being from nothingness into existence. "Crowned with glory and honour," man is, after the angels, capable of acknowledging "how majestic is the name of the Lord in all the earth." Even after losing through his sin his likeness to God, man remains an image of his Creator, and retains the desire for the one who calls him into existence

2567 God calls man first. Man may forget his Creator or hide far from his face; he may run after idols or accuse the deity of having abandoned him; yet the living and true God tirelessly calls each person to that mysterious encounter known as prayer. In prayer, the faithful God's initiative of love always comes first; our own first step is always a response. As God gradually reveals himself and reveals man to himself, prayer appears as a reciprocal call, a covenant drama. Through words and actions, this drama engages the heart. It unfolds throughout the whole history of salvation.

2568 In the Old Testament, the revelation of prayer comes between the fall and the restoration of man... Prayer is bound up with human history, for it is the relationship with God in historical events.



Why do we venerate relics?

Did you know that Catholics don't worship relics, but rather, we venerate them? This is one of the most misunderstood parts of our faith. The word "veneration" comes from the Latin word, venerare, meaning to regard with reverence and respect. It's an honour shown to holy people and things, unlike adoration reserved for God alone.

A relic is an object connected with a saint or another holy person. They are typically divided into three categories:

First-class relics are a part of the saint's body, such as a bone fragment or a lock of hair. Second-class relics are items that the saint personally owned or frequently used, like a book, a piece of clothing, or a crucifix. Third-class relics are objects, often a piece of cloth, that have been touched to a first-class relic.

We venerate relics because they serve as tangible links to those who have lived lives of heroic virtue and holiness. They remind us that saints were real people, just like us, who were filled with God's grace. This practice is rooted in Sacred Scripture, as shown in the Old Testament when a dead man was brought back to life after his body touched the bones of the prophet Elisha (2 Kings 13:21). This tradition, rooted in the early Church's honour for the remains of martyrs, inspires us to imitate the saints and ask for their powerful intercession that we, through their example, may live lives of holiness.

Second Reading Letter of St. Paul to Timothy (1 Timothy 2:1-8)

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone – petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving – and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have

been named a herald and apostle of it and -I am telling the truth and no lie - a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

Gospel Acclamation (2 Corinthians 8:9)

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus Christ was rich but he became poor, to make you rich out of his poverty. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 16:1-13)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."

'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?
