

Important Notice about parking cars at Holy Family Church

Our priests often have to leave the church property at a moment's notice to attend to important parish duties or appointments. When the driveway is blocked, it causes unnecessary delays and can make it difficult for them to carry out their ministry.

We ask that you show consideration and respect for our priests and their work by parking sensibly, and not blocking the presbytery driveway or garages.

Please allow the upper end of the driveway, opposite the statue of the Pieta, for those who are bringing elderly or those unable to walk long distances to Mass. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

St. Louis Martin

Today, we turn our attention to an extraordinary patron of fatherhood: St Louis Martin. The father of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, St. Louis wasn't a king or a crusader, but a quiet, ordinary man who lived an extraordinary life of faith. A watchmaker by trade, his life was one of humble dedication to his family and to God.

St. Louis and his wife, St. Zélie, were a team, creating a home rich in love and faith where five of their daughters would eventually enter religious life. As a father, Louis modelled patience and deep piety. He taught his daughters to love God through daily prayer and by his own example of charity and integrity. When Zélie died, Louis embraced the challenge of raising his youngest daughters alone with grace and steadfast faith.

The most profound testament to his fatherhood is how he actively fostered his daughters' vocations. He not only gave his consent but considered it "a great honour" that the Lord wanted all of his children. His life shows that a father's love, sacrifice, and gentle guidance can nurture saints. St. Louis Martin reminds us that a father's greatest legacy isn't worldly success, but the faith he instills in his children. He is a powerful intercessor of all fathers.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

The Role of Parents

2214 The divine fatherhood is the source of human fatherhood; this is the foundation of the honour owed to parents. The respect of children, whether minors or adults, for their father and mother is nourished by the natural affection born of the bond uniting them. It is required by God's commandment.

2221 The fecundity of conjugal love cannot be reduced solely to the procreation of children, but must extend to their moral education and their spiritual formation. The role of parents in education is of such importance that it is almost impossible to provide an adequate substitute. The right and the duty of parents to educate their children are primordial and inalienable.

2222 Parents must regard their children as children of God and respect them as human persons. Showing themselves obedient to the will of the Father in heaven, they educate their children to fulfil God's law.

2223 Parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children. They bear witness to this responsibility first by creating a home where tenderness, forgiveness, respect, fidelity, and disinterested service are the rule.

CATHOLIC Trivia

What are Ember Days?

Ember Days are an ancient practice, dating back to the 5th century, and mark the change of seasons that invite us to a deeper connection with God's creation. The name comes from the Latin *Quattuor Tempora* or "four times."

Historically, the Church in the Northern Hemisphere has observed Ember Days four times a year, on a Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday. These days follow the Feast of St. Lucy (December 13th) for winter, the First Sunday of Lent for spring, Pentecost Sunday for summer, and the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 14th) for autumn. These days were historically observed with fasting abstinence, and prayer, often with Mass celebrated in a violet chasuble.

In Australia, the Ember Days don't align with seasons of the Northern Hemisphere, but the spirit of the tradition remains. The Australian Bishops have designated two Ember Days for our Church calendar. These are the first Fridays of March and September. These days are a valuable opportunity to fast and pray in thanksgiving for the harvest and the productivity of human labour. They are also a time to seek God's blessing on the new season, pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life, and reflect on our responsibilities as stewards of creation. Join others on the next Ember Day and continue this practice.

The Readings

Introit (Psalm 118:137, 124)

You are just, O Lord, and your judgement is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love.

Second Reading Letter of St Paul to Philemon (Philemon 12-17:Phlm 9-10, 12-17)

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus.

I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father

I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him – I could say – a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

Gospel Acclamation (Psalm 118:135)

Alleluia, alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia!

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 14:25-33)

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'

Communio (Cf Psalm 41:2-3)

Like the deer that yearns for running streams, so my soul is yearning for you, my God; my soul is thirsting for God, the living God.

"Love for his wife as mother of their children and love for the children themselves are for the man the natural way of understanding and fulfilling his own fatherhood." St. Pope John Paul II
