Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed

As November commences, the Holy Church direct our hearts and minds to the profound truth of the Communion of Saints. This is not just a nice idea; but a fundamental reality of our Faith that binds every baptised soul together into one great spiritual family. It is especially fitting to meditate upon this truth at the start of November, in particular this weekend, as we commemorate all the Faithful Departed, also known as All Souls' Day.

The Church teaches us that her members exist in three distinct but united states: the Church Triumphant, the Church Militant, and the Church Suffering.

The **Church Triumphant** is compromised of the Saints in Heaven, those blessed souls who have completed their earthly pilgrimage, passed through the judgement of God, and now enjoy the eternal bliss of seeing Almighty God face-to-face. They have triumphed over sin and death, and they reign with Christ the King. We honour them, we strive to imitate

their virtues, and we implore their powerful prayers and intercession. The Saints are not passive spectators; they are our older brothers and sisters in Christ, constantly pleading for us before the throne of God.

The Church Militant is us - the faithful here on Earth. We are the Church "fighting the good fight," struggling against the world, the flesh, and the devil. We are given the sacraments, especially the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and the Sacrament of Confession, as our armour and spiritual strength. Our duty is to persevere in the state of grace and, through prayer and good works, earn our own place in the Church Triumphant.

Finally, there is the **Church Suffering.** This is the state of the Holy Souls detained in Purgatory. These souls died in God's grace and are certain of Heaven, but they were not perfectly clean of all attachment to sin, or they still owed a temporal debt for forgiven sins. Purgatory is a place of profound

purification, where the soul is cleansed by suffering until it is perfectly pure and ready to stand before the infinite holiness of God.

The incredible beauty of the Communion of Saints lies in the unity and exchange between these three groups. The Saints Triumphant prayer for us, the Militant and the Suffering. We, the Militant, pray for the Saints, praising God for them, but most importantly, we pray and offer up sacrifices for the Holy Souls in Purgatory - the Suffering. This is the great work of charity for November. The souls in Purgatory cannot help themselves, they are completely dependent on us.

Because of this spiritual bond, every prayer, every act of penance, every Holy Mass offered for a deceased person is a true help, a spiritual aid that can shorten their time of suffering and hasten their entry into Heaven. Let us resolve to pray fervently, that we may be true members of this great Communion and fulfil our sacred obligation to the Holy Souls.


November Mass Intentions for the Souls in Purgatory

St. Pier Giorgio Frassati

St. Charles Borromeo was a powerful Italian cardinal and Archbishop of Milan, renowned as a pivotal figure of the Counter-Reformation. Born into nobility, he was related to Pope Pius IV, who appointed him cardinal-deacon and Secretary of State at a young age. After his brother's death, Charles renounced wealth and an offer to marry, committing fully to the Church. He was ordained a priest and consecrated as bishop in 1563.

Charles became the Archbishop of Milan, where he dedicated himself to practical reform, establishing seminaries for priests, and promoting catechism. His connection to Purgatory is vividly demonstrated by his heroic charity during the plague and famine of 1576. When civil authorities fled, Charles remained in Milan, personally ministering to the sick and poor, sacrificing his wealth to feed the hungry.

His work was a deep reflection of the Communion of Saints: through fervent prayer and works of mercy, he alleviated both the physical suffering of the living and the spiritual suffering of the faithful departed. His life of radical penance and selfless service is a model of the holiness required to quickly reach the Church Triumphant and assist the Holy Souls in Purgatory.

CATECHISM of the **CATHOLIC CHURCH**

Purgatory

1030 All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven.

1031 The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire: "As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come."

1032 This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture... From the beginning the Church has honoured the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God.

Catholicism's Pop Influence

Catholicism has exerted a deep and often subtle influence on modern popular culture, extending far beyond overtly religious stories.

In literature and film, Catholic authors have shaped entire genres. J.R.R. Tolkien, a devout Catholic, infused The Lord of the Rings with themes of sacrifice, free will, and the battle between good and evil. Director Martin Scorsese, a former seminarian, consistently uses Catholic imagerycrucifixes, confessionals, and moral struggle—to frame his narratives of sin and redemption in films like Mean Streets and Silence.

Historically, the Church's influence was even more direct. The Motion Picture Production Code (the Hays Code) that governed Hollywood content from 1934 to 1968 was coauthored by influential Catholics, including Jesuit priest Rev.Daniel A. Lord. This code essentially enforced a Catholic-based moral framework on American cinema for decades, shaping the "Golden Age" of film.

Visually, Catholicism provides powerful iconography that instantly communicates drama and tradition, making its imagery (priest's attire, the Rosary) a constant element in movies, particularly in genres like horror (e.g., The Exorcist) where the ritualistic nature and authority of the Church are leveraged for dramatic effect.

Second Reading Letter of St. Paul to the Romans

(Romans 5:5-11)

Hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled, surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

Gospel The Gospel of St. Luke (Luke 18:9-14)

Jesus went to a town called Nain, accompanied by his disciples and a great number of people. When he was near the gate of the town it happened that a dead man was being carried out for burial, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a considerable number of the townspeople were with her. When the Lord saw her he felt sorry for her. 'Do not cry,' he said. Then he went up and put his hand on the bier and the bearers stood still, and he said, 'Young man, I tell you to get up'. And the dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Everyone was filled with awe and praised God saying, 'A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people.' And this opinion of him spread throughout Judaea and all over the countryside.

I am the Resurrection and the Life, says the Lord. Whoever believes in me, even though he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will not die for ever.
