# The Holy Mass: Our Highest Form of Prayer

In the treasury of the Catholic Faith, we find many jewels of devotion: the Holy Rosary, litanies, mental prayer, and hours of adoration. Yet, one act of worship stands infinitely above all others: the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. it is not merely a prayer; it is the prayer. As the Second Vatican Council reiterated, it is the "source and summit of Christian life" (Lumen Gentium, 11)

Why does it hold supreme status? Because the profound dignity of the Mass does not come from us, but from who is offering it and what is offered. It is the un-bloody re-presentation of Christ's one, perfect, and eternal sacrifice on the Cross at Calvary. The Council of Trent defined infallibly that the Mass is a "true and proper sacrifice" offered to God, the very same sacrifice as the Cross, differing only in the manner of offering.

In every other prayer, we offer God our own fallible works, thoughts, and petitions. But in the Mass, we unite ourselves to the High Priest, Jesus Christ, who offers Himself - the perfect Victim - to the Father. The saints, who understood this mystery deeply, found that even the highest forms of praise (superlatives) were insufficient to describe its true worth.

St. John Vianney, the patron saint of priests, taught: "All the good works in the world are not equal to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass because they are the works of men; but the Mass is the work of God. Since the Mass is the work of God, its value is infinite, Its power is limitless. As the Church's perfect offering, the Mass fulfils the four primary ends of prayer more perfectly than any human devotion ever could. It is our greatest act of Adoration to the Holy Trinity, our most profound Thanksgiving for all graces received, our most effective plea for petition, and the only true sufficient Reparation for the sins of the living and the dead.

St. Padre Pio, the great mystic, insisted, "It is easier for the earth to exist without the sun than without

the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass." It is the Mass that holds back divine justice and unleashes a torrent of grace upon the world.

Understanding this reality dictates our response. We are not spectators at a performance; we are participants at the foot of the Cross, standing with Our Lady. This truth demands our complete attention. Our preparation for Mass should not begin when we enter the pew, but in our hearts before we even leave home.

This reverence is manifested externally: in the profound genuflection toward the tabernacle, in the silence we maintain within the holy space, and in our posture of kneeling during the Consecration acknowledging that we are before the living God. As St. Alphonsus Liguori advised, we must "attend Mass as if it were the only Mass you were ever to hear..." Let us therefore approach the altar with renewed awe, recognising the Mass as the most powerful prayer on earth.


## **November Mass Intentions for the Souls in Purgatory**

## The Luminous Mysteries The Light of Christ: Sacraments and Mission

As we conclude our meditative journey through the Holy Rosary, we turn our gaze to the Luminous Mysteries, or the Mysteries of Light. These mysteries focus specifically on Our Lord's public life, the period in which He most fully revealed Himself as the Divine Son of God and established the necessary Sacraments of grace for His Church. Though a later addition to the traditional fifteen mysteries, they are a powerful complement that illuminates Christ's active ministry, focusing our minds on the true nature of discipleship and the centrality of the Eucharist.

The first light shines in the wilderness at the Baptism in the Jordan. Here, Our Lord initiates His saving mission. The voice of the Eternal Father is heard, "This is My Beloved Son," and the Holy Spirit descends. This perfect manifestation of the Trinity is a powerful reminder of the dignity of our own Baptism, which made us adopted children of God and consecrated us for service. This mystery calls us to a firm resolve to be faithful to our Baptismal Vows and to live a life open to the Holy Spirit, allowing Him to guide every choice we make.

The light next illuminates the **Wedding at Cana.** At the quiet insistence of His Mother, Our Lord performs His first public miracle, changing water into wine. This is a

profound testament to the power of Marian intercession. Our Lady's simple but absolute instruction to the servant, "Do whatever He tells you," is the most perfect summary of Christian spirituality. This mystery teaches us trust in the intercession of Mary and encourages us to have faith in God's will, bringing our human needs and limitations before Christ through her, knowing He can turn the ordinary into the miraculous.

The light spreads forth with the Proclamation of the Kingdom of God. Our Lord preaches the Gospel, calling humanity to immediate repentance and conversion. He lays out the law of the Kingdom in the Beatitudes, a radical spiritual code that entirely contradicts the values of the world. This is a perpetual call to conversion; we are challenged to constantly examine our consciences and change our hearts, ensuring our lives truly reflect the values of the Kingdom. The call is urgent: we must be actively engaged in furthering God's reign on earth through prayer and good works.

We are given a spectacular glimpse of Heaven in **The Transfiguration.** On Mount Tabor, Jesus reveals His Divine Glory to Sts. Peter, James and John. This dazzling event confirms the absolute truth of His divinity and fortifies the Apostles for the events

they would soon face on Calvary. This moment is a powerful image of what happens to the soul in contemplation and prayer. It inspires us to seek interior holiness, to go up the mountain through deeper prayer, so that we too may be transfigured by grace and reflect Christ's light into the world's darkness.

The final and most brilliant light is the Institution of the Eucharist. At the Last Supper, Our Lord performed the greatest miracle of all, gifting us the Sacrament of Sacraments: His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity, truly present under the appearances of bread and wine. This is the source and summit of our entire Catholic life, the continuation of the Sacrifice of Calvary. This mystery demands of us a profound reverence, an ardent love for the Eucharist, and a constant spirit of adoration. It reminds us that our spirituality must centre entirely on the Altar, and that the greatest encounter we can have with Christ this side of Heaven is in Holy Communion.

As this month dedicated to the Holy Rosary concludes, let us renew our commitment to this powerful devotion. May the twenty mysteries form a complete picture of Christ in our minds, leading us into a deeper love for Him through the guidance of His Immaculate Mother.


The Holy Cross Parish app is just another way of keeping updated on everything that takes place in the parish!

#### St. Pier Giorgio Frassati

Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925) was a vibrant Italian Catholic activist and a member of a prominent Turin family. Despite his privileged background, he dedicated his short life to serving the poor and marginalised, joining groups like the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul and the Third Order of Saint Dominic. He was renowned for his radiant joy, passion for social justice, and deep spiritual life centred on the Holy Eucharist.

An avid athlete and mountaineer. his personal motto was "Verso l'alto" ("To the heights"), reflecting his constant pursuit of holiness. He studied mining engineering, intending "to serve Christ better among the miners." He was a vocal opponent of Fascism and was arrested during a demonstration. Frassati died suddenly at age 24 from poliomyelitis, which doctors suspected he contracted while tirelessly assisting the sick.

His family was astonished when thousands of the city's poor and needy attended his funeral, revealing the profound impact of his hidden charity. Beatified in 1990 by Pope John Paul II, who called him the "Man of the Beatitudes, "Frassati was canonised by Pope Leo XIV on September 7, 2025, and is now a global patron for youth and athletes.

## **CATECHISM** of the **CATHOLIC CHURCH**

#### The Life of Prayer

2697 Prayer is the life of the new heart. It ought to animate us at every moment. But we tend to forget him who is our life and our all. This is why the Fathers of the spiritual life in the Deuteronomic and prophetic traditions insist that prayer is a remembrance of God often awakened by the memory of the heart: We must remember God more often than we draw breath. But we cannot pray at all times if we do not pray at specific times, consciously willing it. These are the special times of Christian prayer, both in intensity and duration. 2698 The Tradition of the Church proposes to the faithful certain rhythms of praying intended to nourish continual prayer. Some are daily, such as morning and evening prayer, grace before and after meals, the Liturgy of the Hours. Sundays, centred on the Eucharist are kept holy primarily by prayer. The cycle of the liturgical year and its great feasts are also basic rhythms of the Christian's life of prayer.

2699 The Lord leads all persons by path and in ways pleasing to him, and each believer responds according to his heart's resolve and the personal expressions of his prayer. However, Christian Tradition has retained three major expressions of prayer: vocal, meditative, and contemplative.

#### The Cat-holic Pontiff

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, the noted theologian and intellectual, possessed a deeply human and relatable trait: an enduring love for cats. Long before he was Pope, Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was known as a true "cat-person" throughout his life in Bavaria and Rome.

During his time as a Cardinal, he often fed and befriended the numerous stray cats that roamed the streets near his Vatican office. Witnesses recounted seeing the future Pope stop and converse with the Roman street cats, sometimes in German, as the felines "greeted" him.

In his retirement, living within the Mater Ecclesiae Monastery, Benedict XVI was finally in a "kitty haven" in the Vatican gardens. He grew close to the resident cats, including a pair named Contessina and Zorro, who frequently came to say hello. Photographs of him relaxed and smiling while stroking the cats' fur became beloved images, offering a glimpse into the gentle soul behind the scholarly demeanour.

Archbishop Georg Gänswein, his personal secretary, confirmed the Pope's affection, stating that he loved all animals "because they are creatures of God." This simple affinity for felines remains one of the most endearing facts about the retired Late Pontiff, and his kindness was a quiet testament to his belief in the dignity of all creation.
