

As the Church dedicates the month of October to the Most Holy Rosary, we are invited to take up this powerful spiritual weapon and rediscover its profound grace. This devotion is not merely a string of beads, but a heavenly chain that links us to God through the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The dedication of October to the Rosary is rooted in a dramatic moment in history. On 7th October 1571, a Catholic fleet faced a vastly superior Ottoman force at the Battle of Lepanto. Knowing that the future of Christendom was at stake, Pope St. Pius V asked all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory. Against all odds, the Catholic forces triumphed, a victory attributed directly to the intercession of Our Lady of the Rosary. This event reminds us that the Rosary is a prayer of immense power, capable of securing divine assistance in times of great need.

At its heart, the Rosary is a beautiful meditation on the Gospel.

As we recite the familiar prayers, our minds are invited to contemplate the keys events in the lives of Our Lord and His Mother. We walk with them through the Joyful Mysteries of the Incarnation, ponder Christ's public life in the Luminous Mysteries, enter into His Passion in the Sorrowful Mysteries, and rejoice in His victory over death in the Glorious Mysteries. This journey through the Gospels deepens our love for Jesus and Mary and our understanding of salvation. It is, as many saints have called it, a compendium of the Gospel.

In a world filled with noise, anxiety, and uncertainty, the Rosary offers a sanctuary of peace. It is a prayer for families, a defence against evil, and a source of countless graces. At Fatima, Our Lady herself implored us, "Pray the Rosary every day." She gave it to us as a remedy for the troubles of our times and a sure path to her Son. This October, let us answer her call. Let us commit to praying the Rosary

daily, perhaps gathering as a family in the evening to pray for our world, our parish, and our own intentions. Use the Holy Rosary to pray for the souls of the Faithful Departed and the Holy Souls in Purgatory, that they may be granted entry into the heavenly kingdom. Let us carry our rosary with us, turning to it in moments of trial and moments of gratitude. By embracing this timeless devotion, we place our hands and our hearts in the hand of our Heavenly Mother, allowing her to lead us every closer to the Most Sacred Heart of her Son. May this chain of Hail Mary's be our comfort in times of trial and our joy in times of peace. Let us pray it with unwavering confidence, knowing that the Queen of Heaven watches over each one of us, our families, and our world.

O Queen of the Most Holy Rosary, graciously intercede for us, that we may merit to attain the salvation of our souls and the eternal joys of heaven. Amen

All proceeds will directly support their free legal clinic provided for over 17 years to disadvantaged, marginalised and vulnerable people of Western Sydney.



The Joyful Mysteries: The Moments Announcing the Coming of our Salvation

October's arrival directs our hearts to the Most Holy Rosary, a prayer lauded by Saints and Popes throughout the ages. It is more than a recital of formulas; it is a spiritual masterpiece, a means by which we enter into the deepest secrets of our faith, seeing the life of Christ through the tender, pure eyes of His Mother. By meditating on the Mysteries, we allow the grace of each event to imprint itself upon our souls. We begin this sacred journey by contemplating the Joyful Mysteries, those glorious moments that illuminate the beginnings of our Salvation.

These five mysteries are a school of humility, charity, and obedience—the foundational virtues required for any sincere spiritual life. They teach us that the greatest events in human history unfolded not in the halls of power, but in quiet, humble settings, thereby setting the pattern for our own path to holiness.

We first kneel in the simple home of Nazareth for the Annunciation. Picture the scene: the Archangel Gabriel brings the message, and the Virgin Mary, a young Jewish woman, freely gives her perfect consent. "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it done unto me according to thy word." In that single, humble fiat, the Son of God took flesh in her womb. This profound act of humility and acceptance is the antidote

to the pride and self-will that plague our era. It teaches us that true greatness lies not in demanding our own way, but in the total, trusting surrender to the divine will of the Eternal Father. Without this virtue of humility, no other grace can take root in the soul.

The journey continues to the hills of Judea for the Visitation, where Mary, with Christ in her womb, hurries to assist her elderly cousin, St. Elizabeth. This is active, practical charity in its purest form, a selfless rush to serve one's neighbour. The mere sound of Mary's voice causes St. John the Baptist to leap for joya beautiful illustration that the presence of Christ, carried within us, is meant to sanctify those around us. This mystery urges us, as Australian Catholics, to rise above mere sentimentality and put our faith into action, seeking out those who are alone or in need, and serving them with genuine love and respect.

We then find ourselves shivering, spiritually kneeling, in the cave of Bethlehem for **the Nativity**. The King of Heaven chooses abject poverty—a cold stable, a crude feeding trough—as the setting for His birth. He chooses this ignominy to teach us the priceless virtue of poverty of spirit and detachment from worldly comforts and riches. In a culture driven by consumption and materialism, the Nativity stands

as a powerful, silent rebuke. It shows us that our true security is found not in accumulating wealth, but in trusting in Divine Providence and embracing simplicity.

The Presentation in the Temple follows, demonstrating the Holy Family's perfect obedience to the Mosaic Law. They centre their lives around God's commands and the rites of their Faith. Even as the holy Simeon foretells the sword of sorrow that will pierce Mary's Immaculate Heart, she submits. This mystery is an essential lesson in submission to authority, both human and divine. It teaches us that fidelity to the Law and the traditions of the Church, even when costly, is the path to spiritual safety.

Finally, the Joyful Mysteries conclude with the brief, searing agony and subsequent relief of the Finding of Jesus in the Temple. For three days, Mary and Joseph endured the anguish of loss, teaching us the spiritual reality of losing Christ through sin or carelessness. Their fervent search leads to the Temple, where they find Him wholly occupied with His Father's business. This moment is a powerful call to the virtue of piety the firm devotion that makes God the absolute centre of our work and relationships. It assures us that if we search for Jesus with devotion, we will find the joy of His presence restored to our souls.



St. Dominic

Saint Dominic, born in Caleruega, Spain, in 1170, initially sought to evangelise the Albigensian heretics in southern France through preaching and exemplary poverty. Despite his tireless efforts, conversions were scarce. It was during this challenging period, around 1208, that tradition holds a pivotal event occurred: the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to Dominic, presenting him with the Rosary as a spiritual weapon. She instructed him on how to pray it and urged him to preach its efficacy for conversion and spiritual warfare.

Inspired, Dominic fervently embraced and propagated this devotion. He began teaching others to pray the Rosary, meditating on the mysteries of Christ's life while reciting specific prayers. This simple, repetitive prayer, coupled with meditation, proved remarkably effective where other methods had faltered. Dominic established the Order of Preachers (Dominicans) to continue this work, and his followers became instrumental in spreading the Rosary throughout the Christian world. St. Dominic's legacy as the primary evangelist of the Holy Rosary endures, making him eternally linked to this powerful Marian devotion.

CATECHISM of the CATHOLIC CHURCH

Indulgences

1471 The doctrine and practice of indulgences in the Church are closely linked to the effects of the sacrament of Penance. An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints. An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin. The faithful can gain indulgences for themselves or apply them to the dead.

1472 To understand this doctrine and practice of the Church, it is necessary to understand that sin has a double consequence. Grave sin deprives us of communion with God and therefore makes us incapable of eternal life, the privation of which is called the "eternal punishment" of sin. On the other hand every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death in the state called Purgatory.

The Patron of Oversleeping

Ever felt the dread of hearing your alarm and immediately hitting the snooze button... multiple times? You might need to invoke the patron saint of late risers! That title belongs, somewhat humorously, to St. Vitus.

St. Vitus, a young martyr who died around the year A.D. 303, is perhaps most famously known as the patron of dancers and those afflicted with epilepsy. His association with dance stems from a medieval phenomenon called "St. Vitus' Dance," a condition characterised by sudden, involuntary movements (now known as Sydenham's chorea).

So, how did this energetic saint become the spiritual guardian of oversleeping? It's a delightful paradox! While his most famous intercession deals with those unable to control their movement, he is also invoked by those who struggle with too much stillness-namely, sleeping right through the morning and missing a commitment! This unusual patronage highlights that the saints truly understand the full breadth of human experience. No matter how small or strange your daily struggle-even the battle with the alarm clock—there is a holy friend in heaven ready to pray for you. Now you know exactly who to call on Monday morning to help you seize the day! No petition is too minor when seeking God's help.
