MORE THAN A BIRTHDAY

The Deeper Meaning of Christmas



The Christmas we celebrate today is certainly a day of joy, family, and light, but its significance extends far beyond a seasonal festival. It is the yearly commemoration of the most significant and awesome event in human history: the Incarnation - God becoming Man.

When we gaze upon the Nativity scene, we see a helpless infant lying in a manger. This sight, so simple and tender, masks an infinite mystery. This child is the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, Jesus Christ, who is true God and true Man. He did not merely appear in the world; He was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary, taking on our human nature, soul and body, while retaining His divine nature fully and perfectly.

Why did the Creator of the universe consent to such humility? The answer is found in the depths of God's mercy and love. From the moment of our first parents' fall, a chasm separated humanity from God. We could not cross it ourselves. The prophets had foretold the coming of the Messiah who would close this gap. When the angels sang to the shepherds, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of goodwill," they announced the fulfillment of this ancient promise.

Christmas is the moment when God entered time to rescue us from our alienation. The word, who was with God and was God (John 1:1), became flesh to heal, to teach, and ultimately, to save. He humbled Himself completely, accepting the vulnerability of a newborn. This act of condescension, this willingness to step down from the glory of heaven into a humble stable, is the very foundation of our faith. It shows us that God's power is not just in His thunder and might, but in His gentle, self-giving love. By taking on our nature, Christ made it possible for us to share in His Divine nature, restoring the supernatural life lost by sin.

The poverty of the Manger reminds us that the Kingdom He came to establish is not of earthly power or wealth, but of spiritual grace and detachment. The shepherds, the first to adore Him, represent the simple and the humble, emphasizing that faith is accessible to all, regardless of status. The infant in the crib is the same Christ who will preach the Beatitudes, suffer on the Cross, and rise in glory. His birth is the essential first step of our redemption. It sanctifies the whole of human existence, proving that our lives, our bodies, and our world are worthy of the Divine presence.

Therefore, as we celebrate Christmas Day, let us not only rejoice in the beautiful story but meditate on its eternal meaning. Let us ask the Christ Child for the grace to imitate His humility and to respond to His infinite love with our own. For in the wonder of the Nativity, we find not just a historical event, but the key to eternal life. It is through this Divine birth that we receive the grace to become, ourselves, children of God and heirs to the promises of heaven. May our hearts be a crib, welcoming the Prince of Peace this day.

The Readings

Introit (Cf. Ex. 16:6-7)

Today you will know that the Lord will come,
and he will save us,
and in the morning you will see his glory.

First Reading

The Prophet Isaiah (62:1-5)

About Zion I will not be silent,
about Jerusalem I will not grow weary,

people great when they were living as foreigners in Egypt;
then by divine power he led them out.

'Then he made David their king, of whom he

for Israel one of David's descendants, Jesus, as Saviour,
whose coming was heralded by John when he
proclaimed a baptism of repentance for the whole people

The Gospel of Matthew (1:18-25)

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother
Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to
live together she was found to be with child through the
Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour
and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her
informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the
angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said,
'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home
as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by
the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must
name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his
people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil
the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The Virgin will conceive and give birth to a son
and they will call him Emmanuel,

a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph
woke up he did what the angel of the Lord told him to
do: he took his wife to his home and, though he had not
had intercourse with her, she gave birth to a son; and he
named him Jesus.

The Prophet Isaiah (9:1-7)

The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone. You have made their gladness greater, you have made their joy increase; they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils. For the yoke that was weighing on him, the bar across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian. For all the footgear of battle, every cloak rolled in blood, is burnt and consumed by fire. For there is a child born for us, a son given to us and dominion is laid on his shoulders; and this is the name they give him: Wonder-Counsellor, Mighty-God, Eternal-Father, Prince-of-Peace. Wide is his dominion in a peace that has no end, for the throne of David and for his royal power, which he establishes and makes secure in justice and integrity. The Gospel of Luke (2:1-14)

Caesar Augustus issued a decree for a census of the whole world to be taken. This census – the first – took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria, and everyone went to his own town to be registered. So Joseph set out from the town of Nazareth in Galilee and travelled up to Judaea, to the town of David called Bethlehem, since he was of David's House and line, in order to be registered together with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. While they were there the time came for her to have her child, and she gave birth to a son, her first-born. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger because there was no room for them at the inn. In the countryside close by there were shepherds who lived in the fields and took it in turns to watch their flocks during the night. The angel of the Lord appeared to them and the glory of the Lord shone round them. They were terrified, but the angel said, 'Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by the whole people. Today in the town of David a saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. And here is a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger.' And suddenly with the angel there was a great throng of the heavenly host, praising God and singing:

'Glory to God in the highest heaven
and peace to men who enjoy his favour.'

How beautiful on the mountains, are the feet of one who brings good news, who heralds peace, brings happiness, proclaims salvation, and tells Zion, 'Your God is king!' Listen! Your watchmen raise their voices, they shout for joy together, for they see the Lord face to face, as he returns to Zion. Break into shouts of joy together, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord is consoling his people, redeeming Jerusalem. The Lord bares his holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

At various times in the past and in various different ways, God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets; but in our own time, the last days, he has spoken to us through his Son, the Son that he has appointed to inherit everything and through whom he made everything there is. He is the radiant light of God's glory and the perfect copy of his nature, sustaining the universe by his powerful command; and now that he has destroyed the defilement of sin, he has gone to take his place in heaven

at the right hand of divine Majesty. So he is now as far above the angels as the title which he has inherited is higher than their own name.

God has never said to any angel: You are my Son, today I have become your father, or: I will be a father to him and he a son to me. Again, when he brings the First-born into the world, he says: Let all the angels of God worship him.
